### TOW HOME GAMES NEXT WEEK

Local fans will have an opportunity to see Central Normal in plenty of action during the coming week, with two home games. The first will be played with Manchester on Monday night. This promises to be a real battle. In the first clash of the season Central Normal emerged victorious by a two point margin.

The Evansville clash will give the local boys an opportunity to stop Doerner, Evansville ace, who has an average of 24 points a game. Evansville scored a 56 to 48 victory over St. Joseph's last week and will be one of the feature attractions on the local floor this year.

The Warriors have been showing much scrap lately.

### CONTEST INVITATIONS RECEIVED

### REGISTRAR EIKMAN LEAVES TOMORROW

### MIXED RECREATION PROGRAM TO BEGIN

Mixed Recreation will be opened, for the first time this year, on Saturday night, January 31. Dancing, cards, ping-pong, and other games are to be played.

The recreation room will be open at 7:00 for those who wish dancing instruction and at 8:00 for the regular dancing. Instruction will be provided for those who wish to learn bridge. ### SIXTEEN WEEKS COURSE FOR DEFENSE DEMANDS

A special course is being planned to begin May 4 for those high school graduates who wish to secure special business training for defense positions.

This course is designed to answer the needs for training defense workers to meet the demands being made at present for well trained office workers to be produced in as short a time as is possible.

The courses have been planned for those who have had us training in business--beginning courses in shorthand, typing, accounting, Business English, office machines and office practice.

Those who have had previous business training will receive advanced courses-----intermediate shorthand, advanced typing office machines, office practice and intermediate accounting. All of these courses may be taken in the period from May 4 to August 21.

Under the defense program the two year Business course may be secured in 62 weeks--from May 4 to August 1943. It is also possible to secure the four year's work in three years of time--starting May 4 and extending to December 1944.

Announcement of this course was sent out to all commercial teachers with the commerce contest announcements yesterday.

The committee in charge of this program consists of Mrs. Wean, chairman; Mrs. Johnson, Mr. Green, Mr. John Taylor, and Dr. J. H. Grimes.

The music department wishes to congratulate Uncle Marion McGhehey. He is now a proud uncle.

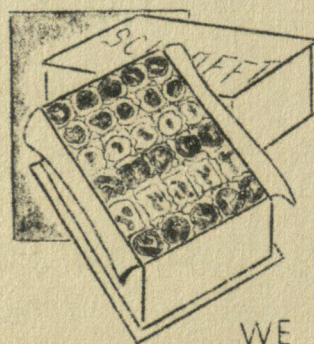
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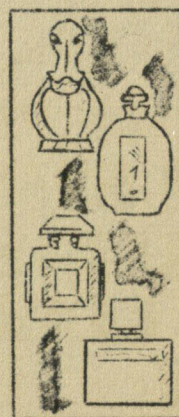
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## DIRT SHEET
