GREEN IS V-1 REPRESENTATIVE FOR CENTRAL NORMAL

Doan R. L. Groon has been appointed chairman of the committee to direct the V-1 Course at C.N.C.

The committee also consists of Mr. Miller, Dr. Hightower, Mr. Elder, and President Hunt.

Anyone enrolling in this service may stay in school for 3 calendar years before he is called into any phase of the navy work. If at the end of that time he cares to try for V-7 or V-5, he may take his physical examination and mental tests to determine his eligibility for the advanced programs.

If he goes to V-7, then he completes his college degree. If he does not pass the examination and remains in V-1, then he will be taken immediately into the V-1 program and becomes an apprentice

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A WORD FOR THE FUTURE

As late as March 21, 1940, Representative Hamilton Fish, of New York made the following statement in a speech: "I do not see how the United States can conceivable use more than 200 planes." This same Mr. Fish, even after the collapse of France, still insisted that air power was of very little importance in the modern war.

This is an example of the narrowness of vision which contributed to the decline and fall of France. The leaders of the democracies in the period following the World War were too intent to find the security of their respective countries to realize that war was possible. They failed to realize that the Versailles Treaty with its many injustices could cause a leader such as Hitler to rise in the conquered country and spread the gospel of hate to a dissatisfied people. They also failed to realize that the temperament of the German people was unsuited to the democracy which they instituted and then failed to support. When Hitler's first "putsch" was unsuccessful, they assumed that this was the end of the movement. But they failed to see that the underlying cause of the movement had been left much the same as it had been.

Only now, after two years of war, do the American people fully realize the importance of air power in modern warfare. The campaigns in the East have shown an appalling lack of air power in the Allied defense.

It would seem practical, therefore, after this war, to maintain our airforce and our army and our navy at a parity with the leading nations of the world. And most important of all, to retain our system of selective service training, which if applied over a number of years would result in a vast increase in the general physical health of the American people. The policies of isolation, of world peace, and of leagues and courts seem very practical on paper, but when the efforts collapse under pressure from within or without, it is comforting to have the protection of an army, a navy, and an airforce of well-trained men.

HONESTY

The end of every term brings with it those dreaded things called examinations. Along with examinations comes a test for our honesty. Are you being true to yourself during these tests?

Of course this term has several meanings but the one most commonly applied to it now is a crutch, a helper or something to fall back upon. Do you think you can "crib" through life and be a success? You may think you are fooling the instructor but you are only fooling yourself. Man's doom, or rather, his destiny is to be challenged forever. Your challenge will certainly be small if you try to "crib" through life and now we are just beginning to weave our tapestry of life.

A man is what he does; we become what we do. If you are a "cribber" now, very likely that will be carried on with you. When out fighting the battle of life, you will either fight to win because you certainly cannot "crib" to win.

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
