MARINE CORPS ANNOUNCES RECRUITING PLAN

Applicants for the Marine Corps Candidates' Class may apply for this juntor efficer training course at the indianapolis marine recruiting office at 406 Kresge Building, according to an announcement by Capt. Ralph E. Boulton of the Indianapolis marine headquarters.

The Marine Corps has expanded its junior officer training to include married men, and men who have already graduated from college and are still being accepted from freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

Men accepted for the

Condidates' Class program are enlisted as privates first class with pay of \$35 per month during their three months training at Quantico, Va. Upon successful completion of this course they are commissioned second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve.

College students who are enlisted will not be celled to active duty until after their graduation unless the national situation requires their earlier training.

Approximately 1400 students are expected to participate in the 11th. annual Commercial Contest which will start tomorrow promptly at 8:00. During the morning the different contests will be held with events in shorthend, beginning and advanced typing, stenographic ability, bookkeeping, and business adjustability.

The different chairmen have been working to complete preparations and all will be in readiness by the time the contest starts. Approximately one hundred achools have already registered for the different events.

Among those from the most distant places are Pleasant Lake, Salem Center, St. Joe, and Hamilton from the northeast section of the state. New Albany Jeifersonville, and Milan from the southeastern part, Oakland City from the southwest, and Rochester and Boswell from the northwest.

Among the schools which have made outstanding records in the past are Bodford, Fillmore, Clinton, Greenwood, Franklin, New Albany, Peru, Southport, and Speedway. Those who have been watching the different county records anticipate that there will be up-sets in this year's records.

Approximately \$1500 is given in achelarships. Trophies will be given to the six schools which rank highest in the entire event. Individual meddls will be given to each member of the three highest terms in each event. Pibbens will also be given in the different events for 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th, places.

The feature of the evening will be the Amateur Contest in which at least ten persons will write for one-half hour. BUSINESS EDUCATION FOR WAR-TIME NEEDS

P. A. Lawrence of the Educational Division of the Burroughs Adding Machine Company, Detroit, Michigan in an article called "Business Education for War-time Moods" says, "War has created the opportunity for schools to volunteer an important service at a critical time.

It is already clear that a great shortage of clorical personnel will be upon this Country before the year is

This shortage arises from two ecuses: (1) the volume of record-keeping and figure work in all types of offices has rison sharply; (2) fower trained office workers are available due to Solective Service, enlistments and better-paging

jobs elsewhere.

Unfortunately, as trained office personnel gravitates to other activities, place is being filled -- in most cases -by inexperienced, untrained employees. To employ this untrained help, and to let it remain inefficient, is wasteful of clork hours -- particularly in war-

The answer to the problem is that training must be given. Who should logically give it?

Business can ill afford the time.

Its war function is production.
Here lies the real opportunity for schools to most an important war-time need in business education. It is recognized that not all schools can most it alike, but a real attempt must be made because Business will have to complete the job in its offices-at the expense of vital man-hours-to the extent that the school does not or can

In any event, the aim is to relieve Business of the largest possible share of its training function, so that it will be free to concentrate upon one important goal--production.
