To enlist in the course applicants must be between 17 and 20 years old, meet physical requirements for enlistment in the United States Naval Reserve and submit parents' or guardian's consent. Students working toward degrees in Bachelors of Art or Science in liberal arts, journalism, business administration, secondary education, or physical education are elegible for enlistment.

A telegram which was received from Secretary Frank Knox stated: "The Navy is proud that your college is undertaking our V-1 plan for training freshmen and sophomores as officer material.

V-7 MAY BE CLOSED SOON

Indianapolis, April 16 (Sp.) -- If colloge upperclassmen expect to apply for the mayal officer training which will make them commissioned officers in the United States Navy at \$1,500 a year, they'd better hurry.

Class V-7, the officer training classification for college juniors and seniors, is expected to be closed "very soon," in the opinion of Ensign Robert Bryant, USNR, assistant officer in charge of Navy recruiting for the Indiand area. Applicants are interviewed by Ensign Bryant at the Navy recruiting station in the Federal building at Indianapolis.

The college juniors and seniors acceptod in this class will be placed on inactive duty until their full college course is completed. Applicants must be native-born, unmarried citizens of the United States not less than minetoen and under twenty-eight years of age. Among their college credits must be at least two semesters' college credit in geometry. Applications must be accompanied by college credit transcripts, three letters of recommendation, and a birth certificate or other acceptable evidence of native-born citizenship.

Those accepted will be enlisted as apprentice seamen, then appointed as midshipmon in the naval reserve after a month's indoctrination training. Satisfactory completion of instruction qualifies them for an ensign's commission in the naval reserve. Thereafter, promotion will be in accordance with regulations. The base pay of an ensign is \$1,500 a year plus allowance for quar-

NEWTON REPORTS FOR NAVAL OFFICER TRAINING

Indianapolis, April 15, (Spl.) -- Charles B. Newton, Age twenty-three, Gentryville, yeoman second class USNR, assigned to the Navy recruiting station here the past several months, was to report for Naval Officer Training in Class V-7 today at the University of Notre Dame.

Newton, who was graduated from Central Normal College in 1940, applied for officer training in V-7 last fall. The class was closed, so he enlisted as a yeoman for clerical work. To gain admission to the school when the class was reopened, he spent all his spore time covering the equivalent of two college mathematics courses in two months. He was admitted to the school on recommendation of his commanding officer, Commander R.H.G. Mathews, Of ficer in charge of Navy recruiting for the Indiana

To enter the school, he must be "broken" from yeoman, a petty officer rating, to apprentice seaman. On successful completion of the course, however, he will be commissioned as ensign.
