MANY EXPECTED FOR MID-SPRING TERM

All Should Publicize Fact

Preparations are being made for a larger enrollment of students to begin their work on May 4.

All present students should make the information concerning this term available to high school graduates who may be interested.

High school graduates may enroll at this time and complete a college degree in less than 3 years. Elementary teachers may return and get a half year or more of credit before September.

Fellows interested in the V-1 Navy program may enroll on May 4 and complete the equivalent of three years of college before entering the Navy.

High school graduates who have had commercial training in high school may enroll for the 16 weeks short course and be prepared for certain office jobs by September. If each student would pass this information on to one person interested in college, it would be of great benefit to Central Normal College.

In departments where it is necessary other faculty members will be secured to take care of the additional enrollment.

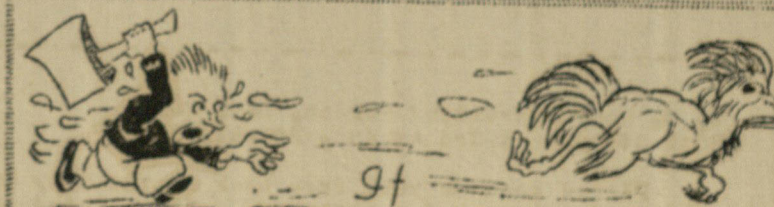
