C.N.C. STUDENTS TAKE CLERICAL ABILITY TESTS

Under the direction of the center examiner, Mr. C. J. Elson, five students are taking the National Clerical Ability Test in bookkeeping and ten are taking the stenographic ability test.

This test is conducted annually in different centers throughout the United States under the general auspices of the National Office Management Association and the National Council of Business Education. These tests have been given for the past three years and are recognized by office managers and employing officials as a criterion showing recognized qualifications. The bookkeeping tests consist of a three hour test over a complete bookkeeping cycle. The stenographic ability test is an hours dictation at a normal speaking rate to be transcribed in the following two hours. Each student who takes these tests must also take a test over general information and fundamentals.

These tests are made by leading business men and educators.

S.C.A. TO SPONSOR WEINER ROAST

The Student Christian Association will sponsor a weiner roast at seven o'clock Tuesday evening at the park.

The weiner roast is to be held for the purpose of welcoming the new freshmen.

Students and faculty are invited to attend. Students who are enrolled in school now will be required to purchase tickets. New students will be guests of honor.

Many new students have been visiting the campus this week preparatory to enrollment in the new term which will start next Monday. At that time new courses will open in each different field.

This term's work will be a part of the general summer program which has been designed to answer the needs of defense work in different fields. Short courses will be started in the fields of business, science and mathematics, and social studies.

Several students will also be entering to start their elementary training which can be completed by starting this term and can be completed by the fall of 1944.

Other students may be entered to start work on the pre-nursing course in which they will take the fundamentals of science, English, social studies, and other subjects needed for entering nurses training work.

New faculty members have been secured to teach the classes in business. Mr. Elwood Miller of Southport will teach the accounting courses and beginning shorthand, and Dorothy Thomas '41 will teach the shorthand and advanced typing classes.

Mr. Miller is a graduate of Indiana State Teachers College with a Master's degree from that school.

Miss Thomas was the outstanding girl of the class of '41. She was president of Alpha Theta sorority, member of Kappa Pi Beta, editor of the Campus Crier, Business Manager of the Centralian, member of Sig-




