Ninety-six candidates for degrees will be honored this morning at Commencement at 10 o'clock.

Dr. John Finch Barnhill and Mr. Corliss R. Maxam will receive the degree of Doctors of Law. Dr. Barnhill, for nany years a noted Indianapolis surgeon, now a resident of Miami Boach, Florida, has been known as one of the nost outstanding graduates of Central Normal College. Dr. William Lowe Bryan, President Eneritus of Indiana University, said in spoaking of hin, "He was the most outstanding medical surgeon produced by Indiana University. He received his undergraduate work at Central Normal College.

Mr. C. R. Maxan is well known to many of the faculty and student body. He was formerly a Director of Placement and Professor of Education at Central Normal Colloge. He is now registrar and Director of Placement at Butler University.




