VALPARAISO---62, C.N.C.--0

Valparaiso's fleet-footed veteran and freshman backs, aided by a hard charging forward wall, ram-bled all over the gridiron here last Saturday afternoon as the Crusaders scored a crushing victory over C. N. C. before a small crowd of spectators.

C.N.C.'s defense was unable to halt the Valpo attack led by Masier, Rehling and Heinche, who punched the line for numerous gains and touchdowns.

The northerners scored in the first quarter and then proceeded to put the game on ice in the second with three more touchdowns. Maddok, Crusader right tackle, added the extra points with his accurate toeing.

Coach Ellie, taking full advantage of the 21-0 lead in the second quarter, used reserves freely in the second half to score five more touchdowns on the tired warriors.

At one time C.N.C. had only one line-man, Mackowiak, in the game with previous football training in high school. This example of inexperience is one reason for the poor showing of the team to

date. However valuable experience was gained by body contact and game experience.

Thompson and Mackowiak, continued their "Iron Man" stunt by playing their second sixty minute game.

The game was played without the services of Redling, Isaacs, and Haviza, who are hampered by injuries.
