## MRS. JONES' SUMMER WORK

A letter from Mrs. Daisy Jones telling about her work for the summer:

"I understand I may have Diagnostic and Remedial Arithmetic, Sensory Education, and either Phonics or Manuscript Writing the first summer term and probably Science Methods, Diagnostic and Remedial Reading, and either Phonics or Manuscript Writing, whichever one we don't have the first term, will come the second summer term.

The two Diagnostic and Remedial courses should follow the basic Methods courses in those subjects. The course in Sensory Education includes the selection and use of Visual and Auditory Aids in teaching. Manuscript Writing includes theory, method, and practice. Phonics includes both subject matter and method. The Science Methods course is a required on the four year elementary course and is a valuable course for the experienced teacher who did not get it on her original two year course. Any of them would be good refresher courses for teachers who have not taught for a number of years.

this year resulted in some interesting findings that I plan to share with my classes this summer. I feel that this year's experience has given me a fresh point of view and that because of it I will have more to contribute than formerly.

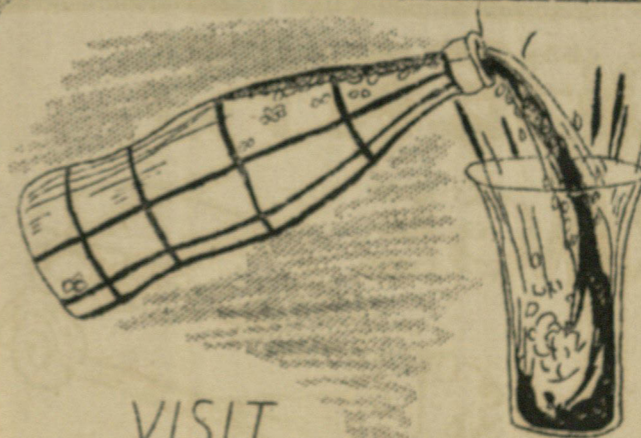

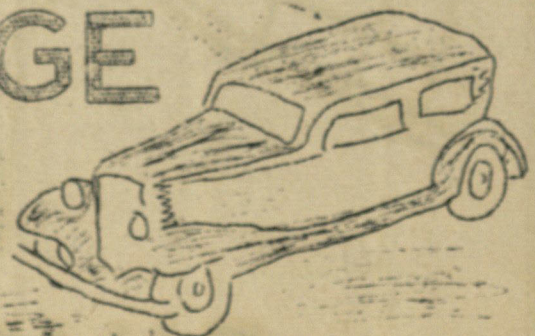
