## NEW TERM TO START MONDAY

### 26 Classes Offered

Classes in Art, Commerce, Education, English, Latin, Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Social Science and Social Studies will be offered in the new term which will start with registration on Monday and classes on Tuesday. According to the schedule of classes Mary Maxine Tharp will teach "Art in the Elementary School," Gymnastic Exercises, and Rhythmics. Mrs. Wean will teach Intermediate Accounting, Methods of Teaching Commerce in High School, and Office Machines. Mrs. Johnson will teach Short-hand and Typing. Mrs. Daisy Jones will teach Diagnostic and Remedial Arithmetic, Sensory Education and Manuscript Writing or Phonics. Dr. Evans will teach Methods of Teaching English in High School and Dramatic Poetry. Dr. Hightower will teach Tests and Measurements and Mrs. Evans will teach Dramatic Art. Mr. W. E. Johnson will give the course in Pliny. Mr. Russell Nale will teach Plane Analytic Geometry, Physics, and Organic Chemistry.

Miss Gaston will give Music Skills and Ear Training and Sight Singing with applied lessons. Mr. Skidmore will teach Music History and also give applied lessons.

Dr. Whitney will teach Entomology and General Biology and Mr. Melvin Sturgeon will give National Relations and Recent American History.

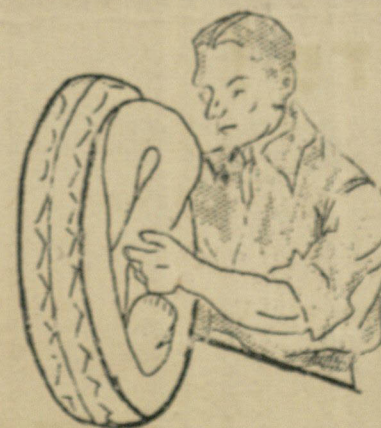

Did you know that Yarling didn't show up at Lott's Tuesday night? It is reported that he was with Fern Mauck.


Dick sent Martha Rudolph fourteen roses Sat. on her anniversary--they've been engaged one year.

Thurston has finally gotten off to see her Dick. By the way, Thurston, when are you going to use your little gift the girls gave you as a going away present?




