STUDENT LOAN FUND GROWS TO OVER \$800

25 Donors Contribute

Over \$800 is now in the funds of the Association of Women Students to be used as a student loan fund according to a statement made by Mrs. Flora Schaefer Evans, Dean of Women. The first gift of \$200 came from the Tri Kappa Sorority through the local chapter. This sum was given to the Dean of Women to be used at her discretion in helping any needy girl while in college. The good derived from this gift stimulated a desire for a larger fund. Letters were written to alumni and friends of the college explaining the plan of a loan fund and giving them an opportunity to help establish such a fund.

The first to respond was Margaret Fitzpatrick with a gift of \$125 with a promise to increase the fund in time to \$500. This money was to be used by the Dean of Women in whatever way seemed most helpful for the students of Central Normal College. This gift, which was increased by a donation from

A survey of the enrollment for the summer shows that 35% of the students on the campus this summer are seniors, 22% are juniors, 14% are sophomores, 6% are freshmen, 9% are special students or post grads and 14% are high school students. There are 87 students enrolled.

BOARD PLANS CONSTRUCTIVE PROGRAM

Farm Bureau Decides to Postpone Action

Although the Indiana Farm Bureau voted to defer consideration of the sponsoring of Central Normal College at this time, the president of the Board of Trustees, Mr. O. E. Gulley states that "it is only the first inning and that other opportunities will come."

Much disappointment was evidenced when the statement was made in the Indianapolis Star last Saturday morning as follows:

"The board of directors of the Indiana Farm Bureau Inc., voted yesterday to give no further consideration 'for the present' to a proposed plan under which the farm organization would have assumed control of Central Normal College at Danville, Hassil E. Schenck, bureau president, announced last night."

The board's action at a special called meeting was taken because of 'the uncertainties ahead and of the problem of maintaining enrollment under war conditions,' Mr. Schenck said.

The plan has been under consideration for the last 60 days in a series of meetings between committees representing the farm bureau and the college board of trustees."

However, the board has held meetings during the past week and has made plans for the operating of the school and for the promotion of the school offering all the subjects.

The disappointment following the action of the Farm Bureau was particularly keen because it had been felt by all that the progress of Central Normal College was exactly in line with the policies of the Farm Bureau.

Dear Dr. Whitney:

With the "tumult and the shouting" over doubtless this week brings you a relief comparable to that of a very stout lady who has just removed her "stays". I hope you are not only relieved that you Hargrave affair is over, but that you are left with a fine sense of accomplishment and a general good feeling about the worthwhileness of the whole affair. Do tell me all about it.

While I have had a very busy week since coming down here, it has also been an interesting and happy time for me. My work is progressing at least as well as I had hoped. This time I think I shall not have to work quite so hard as usual - though still hard enough. I am now reading Shelley and Keats, good hot-weather poets, for they merely cause me to "emoé" and not think too deeply. Fortunately, the kind of feeling they evoke does not make me break out in perspiration (or in a rash such as "demon Daughter" experienced. Remember Felicia's love rashes in Mrs. Morrow's story?)

For the first time, I'm reading Amy Lowell's John Keats. It's a great biography, a remarkably sympathetic portrayal of Keats. Amy Lowell proves her to have been, not the shallow, heartless coquette that Keats' biographers often make her out to have been, but an intelligent and deep-natured woman who was wholly capable of appreciating Keats.

Yesterday I made a trip to Indianapolis leaving here at seven-thirty in the morning and returning at nine, something-or-other last night. It was rather fun to make a day of it, traveling at times when the sun was not unbearably hot. I shopped a little here, and then lunched in a very leisurely fashion, and finally went to "China" via the Indiana. I liked the picture very much - a lot more, in fact, than I liked Noel Coward's "In This We Serve", which was at the Princess Theatre here last week-end, and which seems to me to have been greatly over-rated by the critics. It may have been my mood, however, which made me less appreciative of the latter picture. I must admit that I'd eaten something for dinner which was not "setting" very well at best, and that the constant up-and-down motion of the ill-fated ship was so realistically shown on the screen that the "setting" process is violently disturbed by a very real sea sickness. With that sort of feeling, my mood was rather a bad one for seeing a tragedy and not becoming tragic over it.

At this minute our usual late afternoon shower is beginning. For several days a heavy rain has fallen at about this hour; that fact coupled with another - the extreme heat of midday - makes our weather seem almost tropical. Such is summer life in Bloomington! But I'm not only enjoying it myself; I'm hoping that you also will enjoy it when you make that promised week-end visit. I'm looking forward to that visit and to all the unwritable gossip I shall enjoy together.

WHEREVER YOU ARE

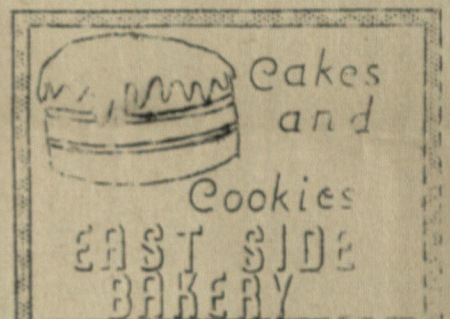
Now it's early twilight,

He'll guide you everywhere.

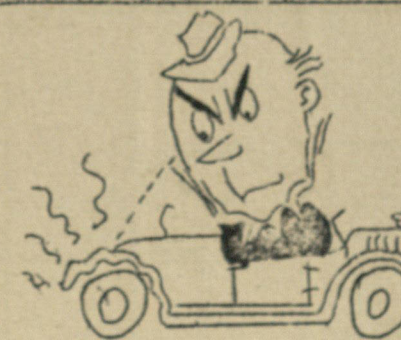
