CNC vs FRANKLIN

Central Normal met Franklin College at Franklin on December 1. The Warriors started out with a bang, taking the lead 6-0. Franklin made a free throw, making the score 6-1. Then the Warriors took off again and ran the score up to 23-13 at the half.

During the first five minutes of the last half

Franklin outscored the CNC boys, making 6 points to our 1. This made the score 24-19. For about six minutes more of play there was five points difference between the scores; then again Franklin came up within one point of the Warriors, 35-34. The Warriors called time out, got together, held discussion, and came back pitching to make two baskets in the next minute. From then on the Warriors kept a lead of four to six points for the remainder of the game. The final score was 46-42.
