Mr. Stump has taken an active interest in educational activities from the time he began teaching in a district school in 1905. He was graduated from Indiana University in 1912 with an A.B. degree, and from the University of Chicago in 1917 with degree of Juris Doctor cum laude.

He has been engaged in the practice of law in Indianapolis for over twenty-five years, and is a member of the faculty of Butler University, a special lecturer for the University of Wisconsin.

Immediately following the track meet Central Normal's baseball team will meet Earlham's nine for the first time this year. This game is scheduled to start at 3:30.

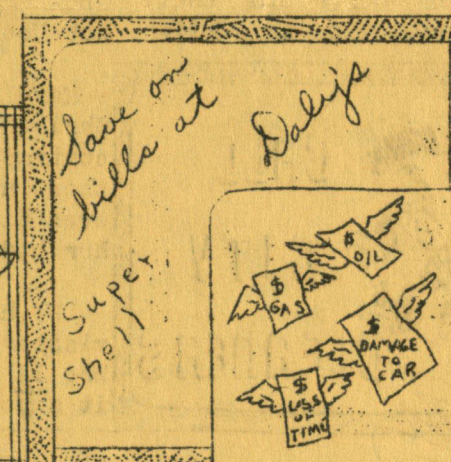
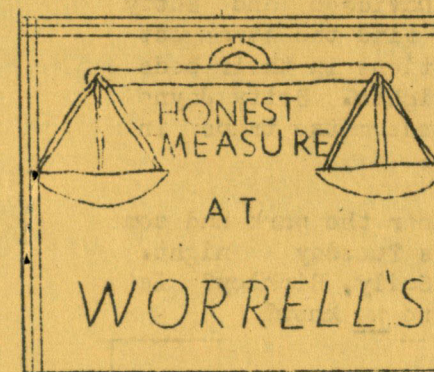
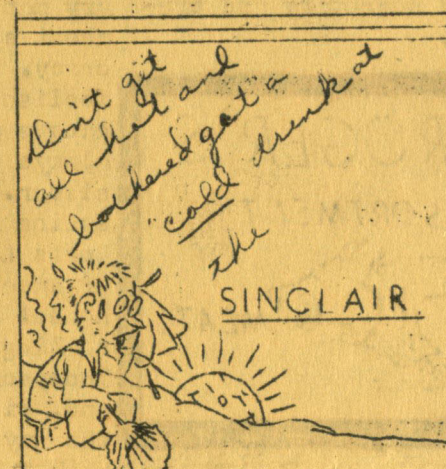

Paul Eddie was seen late Wednesday evening riding Madge Mitchell around on a bicycle. Have fun, kids?

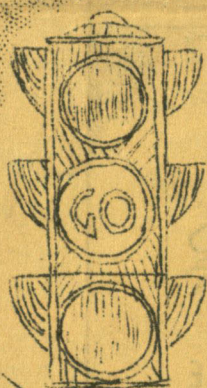
Martha Ryan and Handy Hancock are seen together most of the time. How do you rate her, Handy?
