The following letter was received from Betty Linder:

I want to tell you how much the "Crier" means to me. Whenever I come home from school and find it with my mail, or even by itself, I always feel an extra surge of energy. It is the first piece of mail which I open. As usual, the Snooper page is my first reading page. Even though I don't know everyone concerned, it is still fun to read about those whom I do know. Watching the progress of the different organization is interesting, too. I keep wondering if the W.A.A., A.W.S., and etc. are doing anything exciting. We the temporary alumni always have to "keep our fingers in every pot that is cooking." I certainly miss Danville, the Crier room, Wig-Wam room, the gym and just the whole school. It seems strange to be in a different building and town.

I am teaching in Lincoln High School at Cambridge City. We have an enrollment of about 375 pupils and 15 teachers. I have 4 class in physical Ed., 1 Sophomore biology class, and Sophomore English class. Several of my pupils (boys) are members of the school's baseball team. Our team is first in the county, we have won all our games, so far. One of Phys. Ed. classes becomes a health class on Mon., Wed., and Fri. I am giving the girls basketball fundamentals right now. We are planning on an intramural program soon, and the girls want to play boys rules. However, I am thinking of changing their minds for them, although I like boys rules best myself.

## LEADERSHIP

One of the reasons for attending college is to acquire qualities of leadership. As college men and women leave college and go into the different channels of life they must assume positions of responsibility. The teacher, the accountant or the secretary must have qualities which indicate initiative---or as we say around campus - they have self-starters--

#### VETERAN'S ELECTION COMPLETED

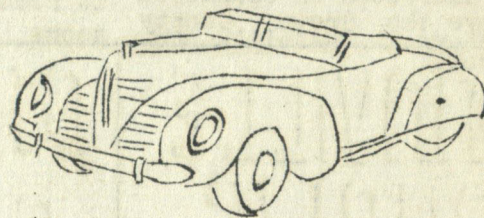
The Veteran's Club met Monday night, October 29, and completed the election of its officers.

My, my, with four beautiful girls all competing for Homecoming queen we wonder how one can decide which to vote for. Boys, this calls for some thinking.

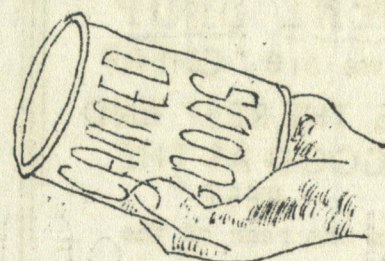
Henley, you better control your nerves in Sociology class. Oh yes, Terry, you better listen to Professor Winfrey instead of Ellis.

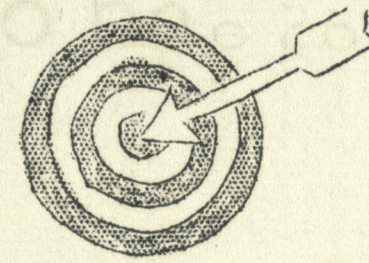

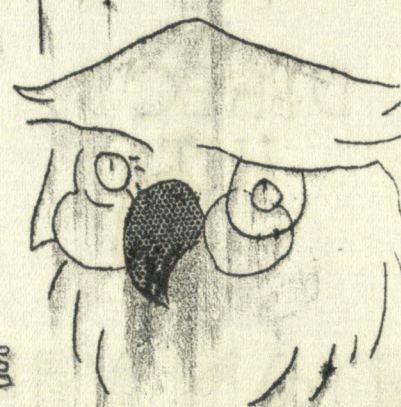

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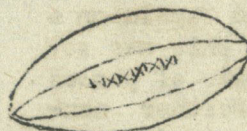
