Our friend and worker, Mr. Glaze, has proven to be indispensable and we certainly are thankful for him.


The Crier Staff appreciates the fact that the Junior Class had their party on the night when they should have been working.


TO ATTEND GUIDANCE CONFERENCE

CARL UNDERWOOD RETURNS TO CNC




He served more than a year in the Marianna s as a crew member on a B-29 and made 27 missions over Japan, four of them over Tokvo.


