CONFERENCE

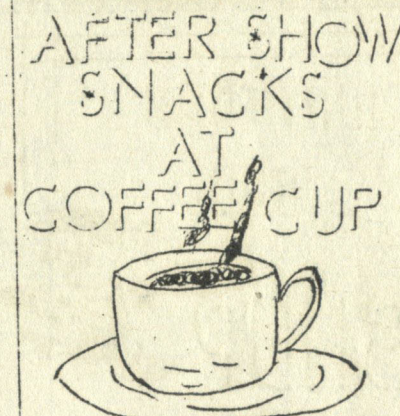

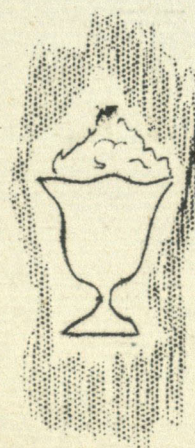

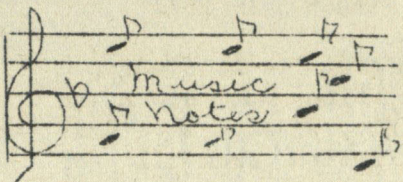
