ENROLLMENT REACHES POST-WAR HIGH

Of the 327 students who enrolled in Canterbury College this semester, 244 are men and 83 are women, (3 men to each woman).

Fifty-nine counties of Indiana are represented with five states besides Indiana.

Hendricks county has the largest enrollment with 119 students. Marion ranks second with 28 students and Clark third with 19.

The freshman class is largest with 192 members. Sophomores have 52, Seniors 41, Juniors 35, with 5 special students and one post graduate. 178 of the students are veterans.

CAN YOU WRITE A SONG?

With this issue of the Crier we announce to the student body the opening of a song-writing contest.

The rules are as follows:

1. Only students and alumni may submit songs for the competition.
2. Manuscripts must be in the hands of the contest committee or in the mail, by November 15, 1946. Any post-marked later than the 15th will not be considered.
3. Contestants may submit as many entries as they wish.
4. All entries and copyrights become the property of Canterbury College. No manuscripts will be returned unless sufficient postage is included to cover mailing.
5. Decision of the judges shall be final. The judges will be three persons prominent in musical circles and songs will be judged on the basis of appropriateness of words and music, and originality. Plagiarism disqualifies a contestant. Any type of song may be submitted: marching song, Alma Mater, school hymn, sweetheart song, or school toast. It may be written around sports, the nickname of the team, "Warriors," the school colors "purple and gray", the buildings, or any phase of campus life. Ease of singing and range should be considered in its composition. Winners and awards will be announced in the next issue of the Quarterly. Turn in your compositions to Miss Marjorie Gaston, chairman song contest committee.

TRADITION TO REMAIN

WARRIORS LOSE TO BALL STATE

The Canterbury Warriors lost their second game Saturday to the Ball State eleven, 27 to 6. The Veteran grid men of Ball State were too tough for Canterbury's inexperienced team. With the exception of one man, Ball State had the same team which won the 1942 football conference.

Starting for the Warrior were, Bob Moore, LE; Frank Gibbs, LT; Jack Lane, LG; J. Lynch, C. Dooley, RG; George Thompson, RT; Capt.; Don Kennedy, RE; E. Reichert, QB; Bob Courtney, LH; Bill Volk, RH; and Jack Brannon, FB.

Two fumbles within the first few minutes of play cost the warriors two touchdowns. The first touchdown was made when the kickoff was received and fumbled in the end zone and was covered by Ball State.

The second period was scoreless but in the third Ball State again scored, making the score Ball State 21, Canterbury 0. In the final period a pass by Canterbury was blocked and caught by Ball State who again scored another touchdown.

Canterbury's one and only score was made late in the final quarter, when a surprise pass from Reichert to Courtney was completed and Courtney went over for the touchdown, making the final score 27 to 6.
