


We Record



Two Years With These


President



All in all, both teams have had a successful year even though they didn't win all their games. As our team has always inherently believed, it isn't the score that counts—it's the playing.


In sports we have learned the spirit of cooperation and willingness to serve. This doesn't mean only among members of the team, it extends to those students who back the team at games.

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
