40 NEW STUDENTS REGISTER

Forty new students registered for this semester last Monday and Tuesday, February 3 and 4. The total enrollment for this semester is 300.

According to the report from the Registrar's office, 36 new men and 4 new girls were added to our old enrollment of 192 men and 68 women. Of the four new women, one is a special student and the other three are regular students. 163 of the men are veterans.

The total enrollment by states is as follows: Indiana 282; Illinois 7; Ohio 5; Pennsylvania 3; Michigan, Massachusetts, and New Jersey each have one student representing them.

HONESTY IS THE BEST POLICY

My mother's father was an insurance man, and one of the companies whose insurance he sold had, "Honesty is the best policy" as its motto. At least that is the way I remember having that watchword impressed upon me. As I have grown older it has become clear to me that honesty is not a policy at all. Policy is based on temporal or material interest rather than justice and honor. Honesty is a way of life, and the only way for good people.

BROTHERHOOD WEEK

The convocation of February 20th will be in observation of Brotherhood Week, the national effort to build better race relations. Rabbi Maurice Goldblatt of the Temple at Tenth and Delaware Streets in Indianapolis, The Rev. F. A. Pfeleiderer who is director of the Board of Weekday Religious Education in Indianapolis and also an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Chester G. Minton, a priest of the Episcopal Church who is Chaplain of the Veterans Administration Hospital and a former Army Chaplain, will each speak briefly. You are urged to come and show your interest in this very important problem.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday which this year is February 19th. The day is called "Ash" Wednesday from the ancient custom of placing ashes, made from the palms of the previous Palm Sunday, on the forehead. Ashes are an outward sign of mourning for sin. Lent was originally a short preparation for Easter, but it has been lengthened to forty days and made rather into a period of intensive spiritual effort and training. It should not be thought of as an effort to be abandoned at Easter but rather as a time in which we build permanently to our spiritual lives and retain the growth made during Lent. To aid in keeping Lent well we advise the adoption of a rule, and copies of a suggested rule may be had from the Chaplain or found in St. Augustine's Chapel. Each day Monday through Friday from 12:40-50 a Lenten service, conducted by the students, will be held in St. Augustine's Chapel, and all are welcome.

Abraham Lincoln has always stood out as one of America's greatest examples of honesty. It may not be literally true that he once walked several miles to return a few cents of miscalculated change to a widow, but it certainly is true that he was a person who tried to live and do everything with honesty, sincerity, truth, genuineness and love. That takes effort, energy, courage, strength, sacrifice and love. Dishonesty is lazy, cowardly, weak and selfish. Though Abraham Lincoln was not baptized or a member of any church he certainly displayed to a wonderful degree the Christ like virtue of magnanimity which rises above what is mean or low or vengeful or ungenerous, and acts and sacrifices for noble ends. We would all do well to learn honesty from him. Honesty which is not a policy but a forthright seeking to go straight with God, our fellows and ourselves.

CREDITATION BY STATE BOARD

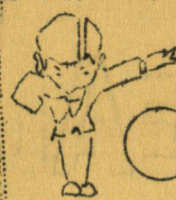
Canterbury College, Dr. E. C. Cumings announced, has been granted accreditation for the academic year of 1947-48 by the State Board of Education.

The Canterbury Warriors hitting 16 out of 21 free throws which played a decisive part in the game, posted their 9th Victory of the season Monday night by defeating Manchester in a return engagement. Canterbury took the lead in the early stages of the game and held it to the very last.

Paced by Springer, Hanson and Gibbs, the Warriors held a 31-21 lead at the half against the determined visitors. The Spartans, giving out with all they had, got within 4 points in the final quarter with the score 48-44, but they could not close the gap on the hard playing Warriors who still held a five point margin when the game ended. Beck, Weaver and Pepple kept the visitors in the running during the game by collecting 13, 12, and 10 points respectively.

Jim Springer, raised his total to 337 by hitting 16 points, and now has a 21.1 average per game, next to John Wilson of Anderson whose average 21.2 at the time of Monday's game.

The group of girls has been divided into three permanent teams.

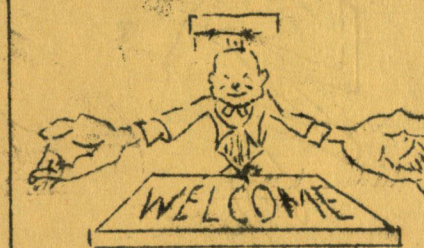

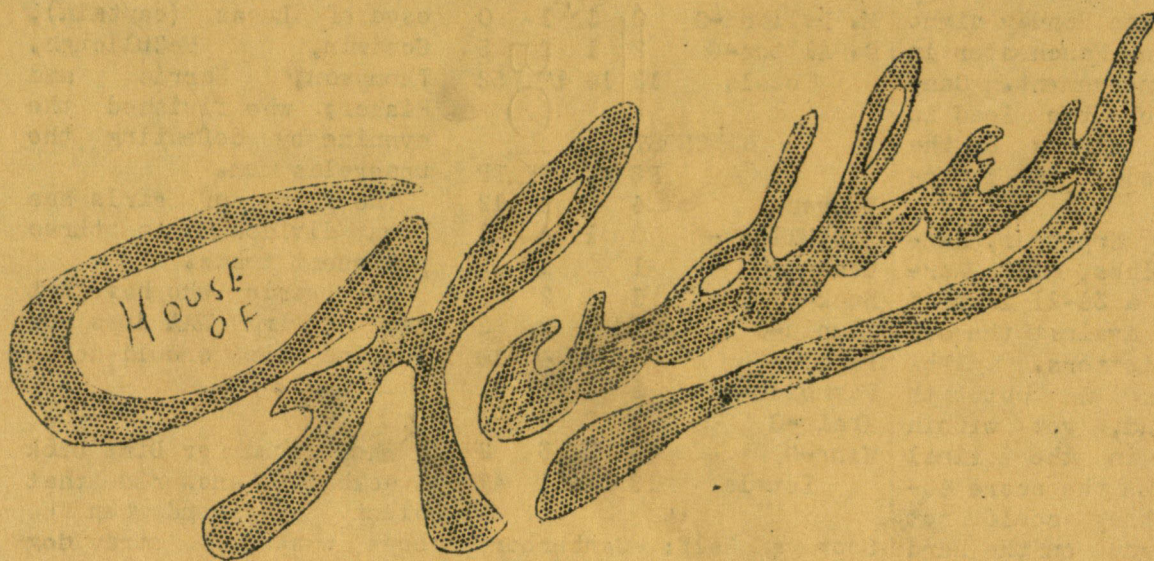
