## BASKETBALL DOPE RATES SPRINGER HIGH

The release of the statistics concerning the Canterbury basketball team have been compiled by the Crier Staff.

As expected, big Jim Springer led the Warriors attack amassing a total of 448 points in 22 games. No single player came near Springer's total which was second high in the state. John Wilson of Anderson with the benefit of more games than Jim was high scorer for the Indiana Conference.

Captain Frank Hanson and "Beezy" Gibbs were second high scorers. They both scored 209 points through the hoop for a tie of second place.

Hardworking "Speedy" Underwood helped himself to 114 points which is a sizeable margin for any hard playing behind a man. Springer's scoring ability.

Although Chuck Alltop was forced to sit on the sideline early part of the season untill such time as he was declared eligible for the Indiana Conference, he still found time in the latter part of the season to toss in 86 points, 19

of these coming in the first game of the N.A.I.B. Tourney held at Kansas City.

Thompson and Pollard collected 33 points. The Miller brothers combined for 12 points, J. Miller getting 9 while A. Miller hit for 3. Byers given little opportunity to score due to constant use of Springer at the pivot position netted 1 bucket.

The Casselman brothers, LeRoy and Bernie, didn't enter school until the second semester and their records haven't been compiled at this writing. However we all knew what a creditable job they did in the few closing games that they played.

Jim Springer established an overall average of 20.363 points per game in twenty-two ball games the past season. In addition to the above feat, Jim broke the gymnasium scoring record of 35 points in a single game previously held by F. Gibbs on February 9, 1946, when he scored 37 points against Defiance College, December 14, 1946. Springer tossed in 16 field goals and 5 foul goals for the 37 point total.

What little I gave them probably wasn't the difference between rags and riches, but it kept them alive a little longer and helped open my heart a little more although it was already over flowing with pity for these unfortunates.

Then my eyes focused once more on little boys playing in the cemetery and I wondered, seriously, if someday they would realize, as I do, what a wonderful place Danville is.

## THEOTOKOS

"Conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary." That's what the Apostle's creed says about the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are reminded of this because March 25th is the Feast of the Annunciation, the day on which, over 1900 years ago, the Angel Gabriel went to Nazareth to tell St. Mary that she was to become the Mother of the Messiah. Because she bore the Son of God she is sometimes called "Theotokos," the Greek for the one who bore God.

The two candles normally used on the altar at the Holy Communion represent the human and divine natures of our Lord. You and I have just one nature--human. We receive it from our parents who are both human. Our Lord's two natures, human and divine, were likewise received from his parents, from his divine Father, God, and from his human mother, St. Mary. The doctrine of the Virgin birth states that St. Mary conceived our Lord through the direct power and intervention of God the Holy Spirit, whom the Nicene Creed describes as the "Giver of Life." Life originated with God. He gave to men and women the responsibility of passing their life on from generation to generation, but the gift of life is still his, and when the time was ripe for Him to come to earth he did it by giving the Blessed Virgin Mary conception directly from the Source of life, not through human intervention, as has been the case in all other births. Thus Jesus, the child so conceived had perfect human nature from his mother and true divinity from his Father. So St. Mary bore him who was at once God and man. Yet the natures are not confused, and He lived here on earth a normal human being, but so closely in touch with his Father that in time of temptation he always used the help which is offered by God, and so was without sin. This sinless life was offered on the cross on Good Friday as an atonement for my sins and yours, and so the gate of heaven was unlocked, and people who love Him began flocking in.

# BASKETBALL FACTS

It might be interesting to note that the Canterbury Warriors are mighty tough when it comes to allowing the opposition points. Only two teams during the past season hit over the sixty mark, and one of these was the loss to Kansas State Teachers in the Intercollegiate Basketball Tourney at Kansas City. The other team to amass that many points was Huntington in one of our heart-breaking defeats, 59 to 61.

On the other hand, the Warriors were able to hit over the sixty point margin five times, twice going into the seventy column.

Defensively Franklin college had the best luck holding the Warriors to 40

points while they hit for 59.

Offensively Canterbury found the second game with Hanover College their easiest touch when they tossed in 76 points against 38 for their opponents.

Overtimes didn't seem to hold any particular jinx for the team which split two extra-inning affairs. The first was won by Canterbury 62 to 58 against Earlham. The second was lost to Wabash 49 to 43. Wabash broke the team's heart when they tied up this game just as the gun went off.

The most inspiring game of the past season was the contest which pitted Jim Springer against Johnny Wilson of Anderson. A standing-room only crowd watched Springer out score the vaunted Wilson 14 to 10 as the Warriors Varsity as well as the Freshman Team turned back Anderson.
