BASKETBALL DOPE RATES SPRINGER HIGH

The release of the statistics concerning the Canterbury basketball team have been compiled by the Crier. Staff.

As expected, big Jim Springer led the Warriors attack amassing a total of 448 points in 22 games. No single player came near springer's total which was second high in the state. John Wilson of Anderson with the benefit of more games than Jim was high scorer for the Indiana onference.

Captain Frank Hanson and "Beezy" Gibbs were second high scorers. They both oured 209 points through he hoop for a tie of second place.

Hardworking "Speedy" nderwood helped himself of 114 points which is a izeable margin for any hard playing behind a man Springer's scoring oility.

Although Chuck Alltop as forced to sit on the ideline early part of the eason untill such time as was declared eligible the Indiana Conference, e still found time in the atter part of the season o toss in 86 points, 19

Gibbs on February 9, 1946, when he scored 37 points against Defiance College, December 14, 1946. Springer tossed in 16 field goals and 5 foul goals for the 37 point total.


On Good Friday there will be a continuous worship from noon until three o'clock.


RESULTS ON THE GIRLS BASISETBALL TOURNAMENT






