The survey will be undertaken during the remainder of May and June by the ar-chitectural firm of Russ & Harrison, Indianapolis. This firm recently made a similar survey of Earlham College in connection with ' the present Earlham dirve for funds.

Dr. Cumings stated that the architects will include in their survey a comprehensive plan for the complete renovation and remodeling of all buildings on the campus, with portions of the proposed work to be accomplished each year until the entire plan is completed. Certain building improvements to be determined by the architects, will be accomplished during the summer of this year.

Mr. Russ has stated that the entire campus layout can be made much more attractive with good planning and a minimum cexpenditure of mondy.
