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## WHITSUNDAY

Sunday, May 25th, is Whitsunday. Pentecost is the Hebrew name for the day which is fifty days after the Passover. Whitsunday marks with Christmas and Easter in importance, and marks the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Christian band in Jerusalem. It is the birthday of the Church, for as we read in the second chapter of Acts the group of a hundred and twenty Christians through their reception of the Holy Spirit on that day were instantly changed from timid, frightened individuals to a well knit family of eager, bold zealots who went out at once to begin the evangelization of the world. The Holy Spirit came in the form of wind and fire, and gave the group the gift of tongues, enabling them to preach to the multitude of devout Jews from every nation who had gathered in Jerusalem to keep the feast of Pentecost. Three thousand of these were converted and baptized that day, and so the church was born.

## WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO TAKE NEXT YEAR?

That's the question many are asking themselves or others now. There are, first, the things which the college requires of you. Some of those things will be down your alley and some won't. Some will be easy for you and some hard. But required courses are required, and with what appears to the college authorities to be good reason.

There are certain subjects which educators feel are essential to a liberal arts course, and while you may not be able to see why this is so, it is safe to assume that they will give you a wider appreciation of life, and enable you to enjoy it more fully. Since you are required to take certain courses, you certainly would be well advised to adopt the view point that alma mater knows best, and get all you can from them.

The courses that do not appeal to you or look hard will be much less difficult for you if you take this attitude. And when the college says, "So many hours in this or that department," don't always drive for the easiest or most practical ones. In other words, to take just one example, there is certainly much to recommend French or German as a modern language instead of Spanish which is, at least by reputation, easier and from the commercial standpoint, more practical. Ancestry, travel, literature and scholarly pursuit seem to point to French and German. Don't pass them up lightly.

Discipline is accepted by most when it will pay off in tangible results, as in athletic training. A well rounded and balanced and ordered mind and outlook on life are too distant to be in the tangible and visible class for most college students, but they are certainly the joy and envy of most adults. Discipline of mind through studying and mastering subjects not immediately practical or attractive bears much fruit in many ways. Now is the time to plant the seed.

The survey will be undertaken during the remainder of May and June by the architectural firm of Russ & Harrison, Indianapolis. This firm recently made a similar survey of Earlham College in connection with the present Earlham drive for funds.

Dr. Cummings stated that the architects will include in their survey a comprehensive plan for the complete renovation and remodeling of all buildings on the campus, with portions of the proposed work to be accomplished each year until the entire plan is completed. Certain building improvements to be determined by the architects, will be accomplished during the summer of this year.

Mr. Russ has stated that the entire campus layout can be made much more attractive with good planning and a minimum expenditure of money.

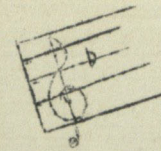
Students receiving scholarships of \$100 each are Anna Marie Monev, Coatesville; and Charles F. Morse, New York, N. Y.

President Cummings stated that additional scholarships will be announced at a later date.

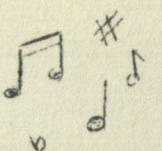
## PSI CHI NEWS
