

LIBRARY FACILITIES INCREASED

Of recent date there has been much interest created around the campus library.

Our librarian, Miss Shaw, has been co-operative in a recent interview and has given some of the information following which should be of intercampus.

From the month of March through the month of May there have been approximately five-thousand two hundred and fiftey-nine school hours spent by students in the library. On Monday night all the This is an increase of seven hundred sixty-eight hours above the previous three month period.

Miss Shaw further noted that the books have been utilized more than ever before during the past several months. This increase shows constructive attitudes of the students in regards to the librarys ever expanding facilities.

Approximately three thousand books have been added to the college library shelves since December, 1946, a large per centage of which have been donated by friends or other persons interested in our growing institution.

Student assistance in the library has aided Miss Shaw greatly. Much work already done could not possibly have been accomplished .ithout the assistance of the following individuals --- B. Meltzer and L. Shapley serving as assistant clerk and clerical workers respectively. B. Gross and P. Stoller as desk routine work, care of stacks and filing. -- A task well done girls:

Forty volumes of periodicals have been bound and stacked for reference usage during the past few months. Eighty-five periodicals have been subscribed for library usage.

Miss Shaw stated that in addition to cataloging three thousand books, a great number of older books have been reclassified, numbered and refinished. Additional cards have been made, making them more accessable to the users.

The most recent purchase for reference collection is the six volume dictionary of American History, edited by James J. Adams and R. V. Coleman . with an additional atlas volume consisting of maps as a guide reference for each phase of American
