A schedule of hours for the Grid Room has been set up by a special faculty committee. The Grid Room will be open according to the following schedule:

SUNDAY - 7 to 10 P. M.

The participating colleges include Anderson, Canterbury, Earlham, Franklin, Hanover, Indiana Central, Manchester, and Rose Polytechnic.

### CUMINGS AT CONVENTION

Dr. Edgar C. Cumings is attending the Provincial Convention of the Episcopal Church which is being held on October 1 and 2 in Milwaukee. The Convention includes all bishops of the Province of the Midwest which includes thirteen dioceses of the Episcopal Church. Dr. Cumings is scheduled to speak to the Convention concerning Canterbury College in an effort to obtain official support from additional dioceses of the Church.

### NEW TRUSTEE ELECTED

Victor A. T. Albright of Bedford, Mass. has been elected to membership on the Board of Trustees of Canterbury College, Dr. Edgar D. Cumings, President, announced today.

Mr. Albright, who took part in the early negotiations which lead to the birth of Canterbury College, was elected for a three year term.

Canterbury College, beginning its second year of operation, enrolled 340 students. Last year 328 were enrolled.

The out-of-state trend at Canterbury continued this fall, with students coming to the college from twelve states, one island possession, and China.

The out-of-state students, most of whom are Episcopalians, are distributed as follows: Illinois, 22; New York, 12; Pennsylvania, 9; Ohio, 5; Michigan, 3; New Jersey, 3; Massachusetts, Wisconsin, and South Carolina each have 2; and one each from Connecticut, Maine, and North Carolina.

The number of Episcopal students has risen from 33 last year to approximately 85 this year. A Japanese girl and a Chinese boy are among the students enrolled.

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## "STONE WALLS DO NOT-----"

Someone has aptly said that "buildings do not make a college." In other words, one's education is dependent upon ability, eagerness to learn, understanding of one's goal, and the like. The splendor or poverty of the buildings have little to do with education.

The statement is particularly apt when applied to Canterbury. Although upwards of 15,000 was spent last year on the physical plant alone, much more than that went to add new faculty members and modestly to increase the salaries of those already on the staff. This is as it should be, but doubtless there are students and faculty members who are disappointed that more in the way of plant improvements could not be accomplished last summer. Doubtless nobody is more disappointed than the college administration, but it must be remembered that the administration and the Episcopal Church inherited a plant which was in extremely poor condition and which will require the expenditure of many more thousands of dollars before it is as it should be.

Of one thing all of us may be certain: improvements will be made just as soon as the funds are available. Canterbury College, while in a relatively sound financial condition, is not yet rich and there is the additional fact that all of the wealthy and well-equipped institutions of higher education required years, decades and, in some cases, centuries before they became that way.

And so, you are asked to be patient and work with us toward our goals. Do not "gripe" and complain about existing conditions, for this will not help. Have faith that we will have a fine campus here someday, and meanwhile endeavor to be constructive, rather than destructive.

It has come to our attention that our football team is not receiving the maximum support from the student body. What if we have dropped our first two games? They were both hard fought battles and either could have gone the other way with a couple breaks. Our boys are out there giving their all, and the least we the student body can do, is to get out to the games and give them some moral support from the sidelines.

Anyone who saw the Hanover game knows what spirit they had and how hard they were trying to win that game. However a little support from the stands might have added that little something that always changes defeat into victory.

We back our basketball team to the hilt. Last year we turned away droves of people from the Anderson game. Let's get behind our football team in the same way. This week our slogan should be----  
BEAT CEDARVILLE----let our football team know that we are behind them 100 per cent.

RENOVATION PROJECTS  
UNDERWAY ON CAMPUS.

Several renovation projects at Canterbury College have either been completed during the summer or are nearing completion. H. Ansel Wallace, Comptroller, announced recently.

New roofing has been put on the Administration Building and Hargrave Hall.

A new cement porch has been constructed on the north side of Adams Hall, the girl's dormitory.

New automatic stokers are now being installed in the two furnaces in the Administration Building. This work also required the purchase of new fire boxes for the furnaces.

The floor of the men's gymnasium has been sanded for the first time since the building was constructed and has been completely refinished. The entire gymnasium has been repainted throughout.

The Dean's Office in the Administration Building has been completely remodeled and divided into three sections, with the addition of fluorescent lighting. Plans are underway to install fluores-

cent lighting in several rooms in Hargrave Hall.

Dr. Cummings stated that prohibitive costs have prevented or contemplated work on the old Recitation Building, but he announced that this building would be repaired as soon as possible.

## GREETINGS FROM THE LIBRARY

The library is open each morning, Monday through Friday, at 8:45, and remains open until 5:15--p.m. On Thursday evenings the library will be open from 6:45 until 9:30.



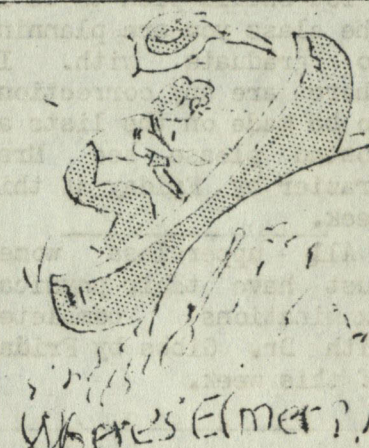

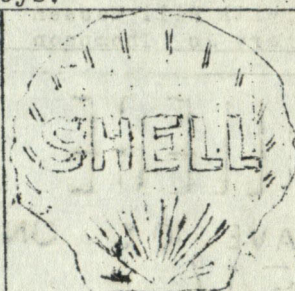

tion of the eight colleges in the four major sports of football, basketball, baseball, and track.

According to the college officials, the purpose of the new conference is to "promote intercollegiate athletics in a well-rounded athletic program, maintaining high ideals and promoting sportsmanship and a friendly understanding among member colleges."

The member colleges have come out strongly against subsidization of athletes.

Eligibility requirements now somewhat lax among Indiana colleges, have been stiffened considerably by the constitution of the new group. An athlete must pass at least 12 semester hours with a C average in order to be eligible. An athlete declared ineligible at the end of a semester remains ineligible for the whole of the succeeding semester, and no athlete may become eligible by making up work in summer school.

Trophies for champions in individual sports and an over-all sports trophy are to be awarded annually according to a point system established by the college officials.

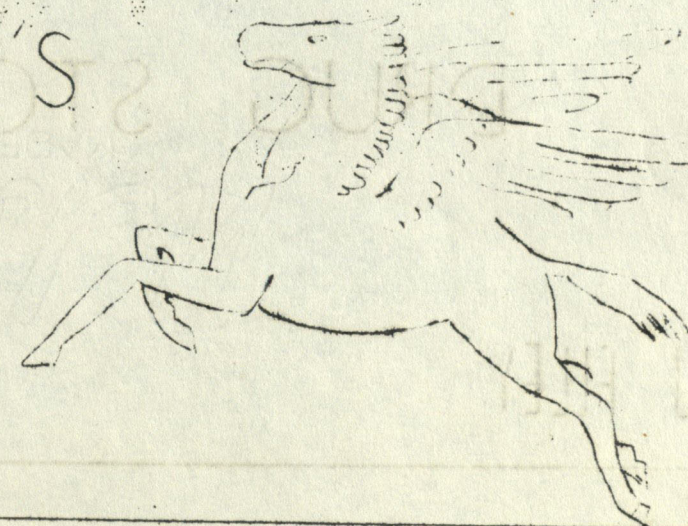

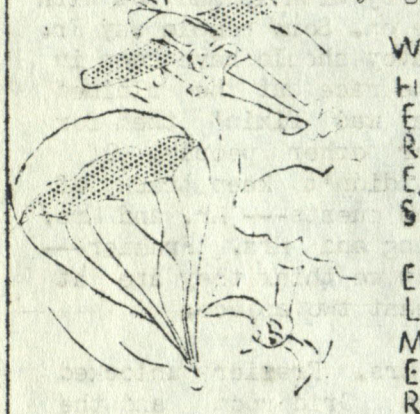


# CANTERBURY COLLASES UNDER HANOVER AIR ATTACK

come better acquainted.



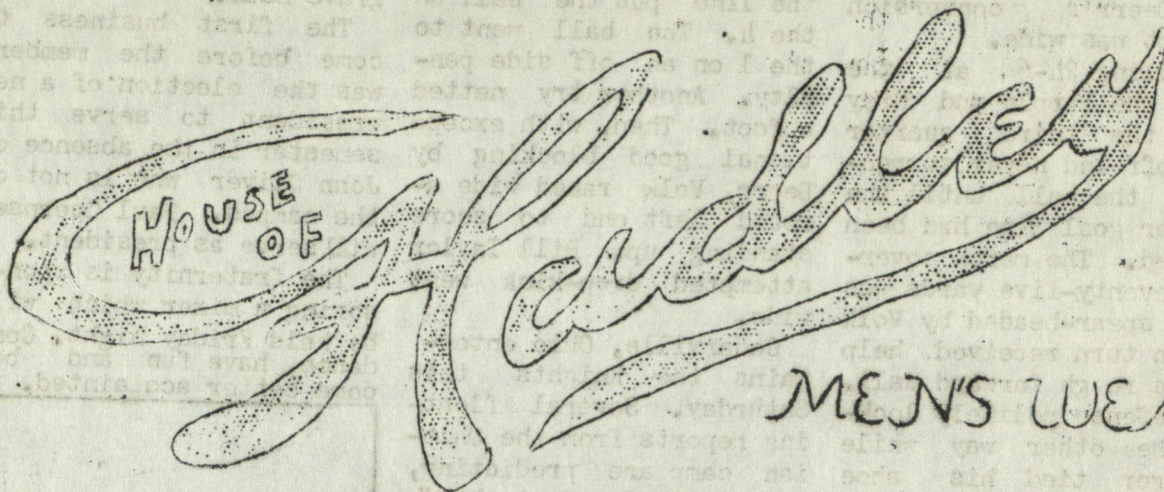
