Someone has artly said that "buildings do not make a college." In other words, one's education is dependent upon ability, eagerness to learn, understanding of one's goal, and the like. The splendor or poverty of the buildings have little to do with education.

The statement is rarticularly art when applied to Canterbury. Although upwards of 15,000 was spent last year on the physical plant alone, much more than that went to add new faculty members and modestly to increase the salaries of those already on the staff. This is as it should be, but doubtless there are students and faculty members who are disappointed that more in the way of plant improvements could not be accomplished last summer. Doubtless nobody is more disappointed than the college administration, but it must be remembered that the administration and the Episcopal Church inherited a plant which was in extremely poor condition and which vill require the expenditure of many. more thousands of dollars before it is as it should be.

Of one thing all of us may be certain: improvements will be made just as soon as the funds are are available. Canterbuw College, while in a relatively sound financial condition, is not yet rich and there is the additional fact that all of the wealthy and well-equipped institutions of higher education required years, decades and, in some cases, centuries before they became that vav.

'And so, 'ou are asked to be patient and work with us toward our goals. Do not "gripe" and complain about existing conditions, for this will not help. Have faith that we will have a fine campus here someday, and meanwhile endeavor to be constructive, rather than destructive.

It has come to our attention that our foothall team is not receiving the maximum support from the student hody. That if we have dropped our first two games? They were both hard fought hattles and either could have gone the other way with a couple breaks. Our boys are out there giving their all, and the least we the student body can do, is to get out to the games and give them some moral support from the sidelines.

Coach Miller has his hands full with a round dozen men injured! The football team is fighting! Anyone who saw the Hanover game knows what spirit they had and how hard they were trying to win that game. However a little support from the stands might have added that little something that always changes defeat into victory.

We hack our 'haskethall team to the hilt. Last year we turned away droves of reorle from the Anderson game. Let's get behind our football team in the same way. This week our slogan should be---BFAT CFTARVIILE---let our football team know that we are behind them 100 rer



The member colleges have come out strongly against subsidization of athletes.

An athlete declared ineligible at the end of a semester remains ineligible for the whole of the succeeding semester. and no athlete may become eligible by making up work

in summer school. Trophys for champions in individual sports and an over-all sports trophy are to be awarded annually according to a point system established by the college officials.
