## CANTERBURY FOUNDERS DAY

Canterbury College will celebrate its first annual Founders Day On Saturday, November 15. President Edgar C. Cumings announced today. The new Episcopal school in Danville will be officially one year old on Founders Day.

President V. F. Schwalm, of Manchester College, will be the principal speaker at a special college convocation to be held at 10:30 a.m. in the Men's Gymnasium. The convocation program will also include remarks by Dr. Cumings and musical numbers by the Canterbury College Band and the Bel-laires, a mixed vocal group. Bishop Richard A. Kirchhoffer, of Indianapolis, will deliver the invocation and benediction at the program.

As a part of Founders Day activities, Canterbury College will meet Anderson College in a football game during the afternoon, and the program will also include a presentation of Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice" in the evening.

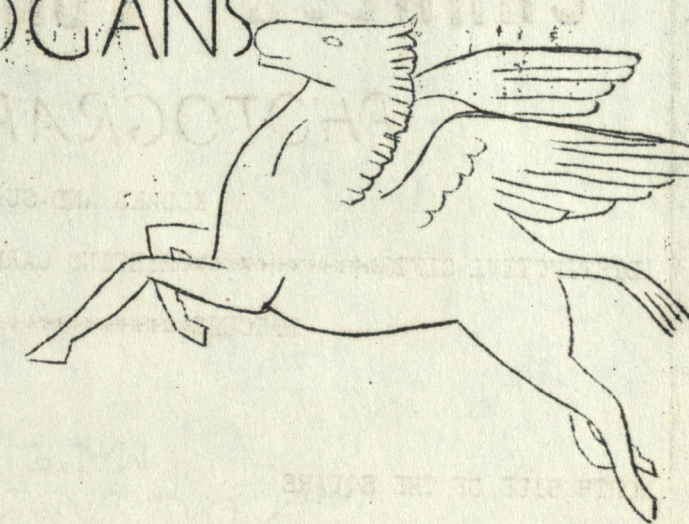

### VETS PAY ON WAY!

More than 90 percent of the veterans attending college under the G. I. Bill of Rights this fall in Indiana will receive their first subsistence checks by the end of the first week of November; the Veterans Administration said today.

Requesting veterans not to become impatient and besiege the Veterans Administration with inquiries, M.D. Cummins, regional manager of the V.A., said that all veterans will not receive their checks on the same day, but that the huge majority of G.I. students will be paid by the end of the first week of November.

There are a few hundred cases of veterans transferring into Indiana from another region which necessitates a transfer of records, Mr. Cummins pointed out, and these veterans have been notified by individual letter of the delay in their subsistence payments.

There may be a few isolated cases of checks failing to arrive on schedule, Mr. Cummins said. In order that the V. A. know of these cases immediately Mr. Cummins said that training officers of the V. A. will visit each college campus beginning the week of November 17th for consultation with those veterans whose checks failed to arrive on schedule.

These training offices will transmit the names of non-paid veterans directly to the regional manager at the end of each day, and the necessary steps to assure prompt payment of subsistence will be taken.

Training officers will continue their visits to Indiana colleges each month to receive reports of any delay in veterans'

subsistence payments, Mr. Cummins said.

There are more than 40,000 veterans attending Indiana institutions of higher learning this fall, some 7,000 more than any previous semester.

### YELL LEADERS TO BE ELECTED FOR BASKET BALL SEASON

The Student Council announced yesterday that the election of college yell leaders would take place in the very near future.

All students wishing to try out for yell leader please give your name to a member of the Student Council or to one of the two personnel deans.

The yell leaders will be chosen by the college students.
