KNIGHTS OPEN AT HOME AGAINST BALL STATE SAT.

The Canterbury College basketball team will make its first local appearance of the season Saturday, December 6, against Ball State Teachers College at the college gym.

By that time, the Knights will have two games behind them, one against Indiana Central, played Tuesday night, and one against Western Kentucky, to be played this Friday night at Louisville.

Coach Glen Johnson is still experimenting with his squad, trying to hit upon a combination that will click. Losses of men from last year's team has cut deep into the ranks.

The Canterbury Reserves will open the evening's action at 7:00 p.m. and the main fray will take place around 8:00.

W. A. A. GIVES PLAY DAY PROGRAM

The W. A. A. has planned a full schedule for their volley ball play day which is to start this Saturday, December 6, at 1:30. They have invited all the high schools in the county to participate. After the ball game the W. A. A. is sponsoring a mixer in the grid room. The Canterbury Collegians will provide the music. The admission will be a small sum of 60¢ per person.

OPEN LETTER TO ALL VETERANS

The following letter was received by the editor of the Crier and it is being passed on to you for your information:

Dear Editor:

In as much as there are some 40,000 veterans attending Indiana universities and colleges this year, I thought it would be a good idea to contact them through your publication on the matter of government life insurance.

Veterans Administration has set a deadline for reinstatement of National Service Life Insurance without taking a physical examination. That deadline is on or before December 31, 1947.

Of the 14,000,000 servicemen of World War II, more than half that number have allowed their insurance to lapse. In Indiana alone some 175,000 veterans of the state's 325,000 have not reinstated their insurance.

Veterans can reinstate their government insurance on or before the December 31 deadline merely by signing an application saying their health is as good as when the policy was lapsed and paying two months premiums, one for the month it lapsed and one for the present month. Applications for reinstatement are available at any V. A. office.

I would appreciate you using any story you see fit to draw the veteran's attention to this deadline, and how simple it is to reinstate their insurance now.

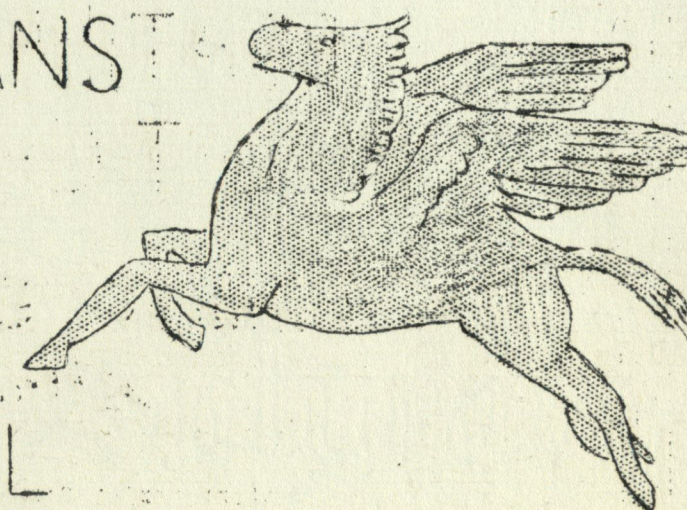

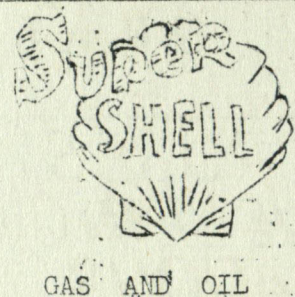

FACULTY FACIS

There is one pretty important fact about our faculty which we often seem to take for granted--the fact that we are lucky enough to know our faculty as human beings. In larger colleges students know their professors only as faces that stand before them in class and fire words, or by little idiosyncracies. The fact that these idiosyncracies are so prominent in the minds of these students seems to me to emphasize their desire to know something about their faculty that will make them appear as something more than intellectual automats. They cling to any little thing that makes their profs. seem more human.

We meet our faculty in many ways outside the class room and meet them as personal friends. In the cafeteria there is no isolated table where feast the gods of the mount of knowledge; instead the faculty stand in line with the students, eat at the same tables with us, and talk to us about the subject of the day which may be miles from the usual

psychics, history of Latin which they usual discuss before us. We come to think of them as individuals with personalities outside of the classroom. We are able to develop real friendships with these people who can help us not only in a certain subject but in other aspects of our education because of their maturity.

We see our faculty at student functions. We saw them at the Halloween party, the Sadie Hawkins dance. We yell with them at basketball games, we joke with them in the halls. We are glad to have them and to enjoy their company. We do not feel a sense of solemnity when they are among us and yet we never lose our respect for them.

The process works in the reverse also. Our faculty know us as individuals with ideals, and problems. The professors can help us with our work from a more personal point of view than a professor in a larger college who knows his students by numbers or as a name on a roll or an examination paper.

The attitude of our faculty gives us the

impression that their theme song might well be the popular song that runs "If you're ever in a jam, here I am." That's friendship....."

Canterbury's 1947-'48 basketball campaign got under way at Indiana Central, last nite, as Coach Glenn Johnson's quintet of hunters met dogged resistance from a squad of barking "Greyhounds." In this case, it goes to prove that a barking dog will bite---bite where it hurts the hardest, for the "Knights" limped home on the tail end of a 64-53 score.

Behind Canterbury's 11 point deficit is the story of a courageous and inexperienced basketball team that didn't know when it was licked. Several times the "Red and White" rolled up a 15 and 16 point margin only to see the gap closed by five determined young men.

Leading the "Purple and Grey" offense, which, at times, threatened to burst wide open was Gil Barry, 6', 7" center of the Knights. For a big man he did a whale of a job, both offensively and defensively. Barry's 16 points took scoring honors on the Canterbury squad.

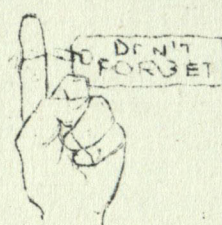
