Believe me, to be with her as she found it out while reading Campus Crier, and then as she listened, was a touching experience, to say the least.

I think she was so surprised and moved by it all that she had trouble finding words to express her feelings.

When we went in to her home and made the usual greetings and apologized for not seeing her for several months, Tommy then handed her the Crier saying "We thought you would enjoy reading a recent copy of the Campus Crier." She looked amazed as she took it but said nothing. Then when her eyes fell upon the lower left hand corner and she read that you had honored her, she said, "Oh they did not need to do something like that for me," then, "Can you imagine that they would go to all of the trouble to do that for me?" These sentiments she expressed several times during the evening. She was eager to hear it. I sat beside her and she told me two times to be sure to tell her if I recognized a voice which she might not be aware of. The

way Virgil described where you were, and the way you planned it to include us, made it mean so much more. Tommy, Miss Watts and I felt so much as if we were about with you there. We sang "Bells of C. N. C." with all of you--Miss Watts sang also.
