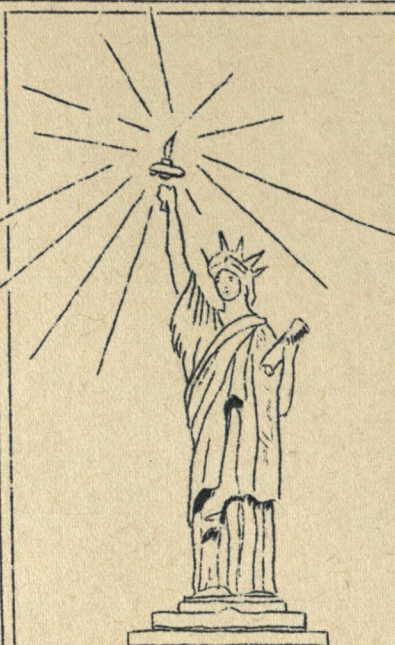

INDIANA DAY

In order to establish a greater good will between Indiana University and Central Normal College, Tuesday, July 5, has been set aside as "Indiana Day" at C. N. C. 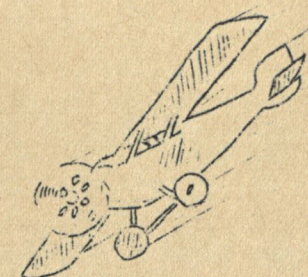
The latter part of the evening was spent in dancing to the tunes of "Squeaky" Martin's Orchestra.

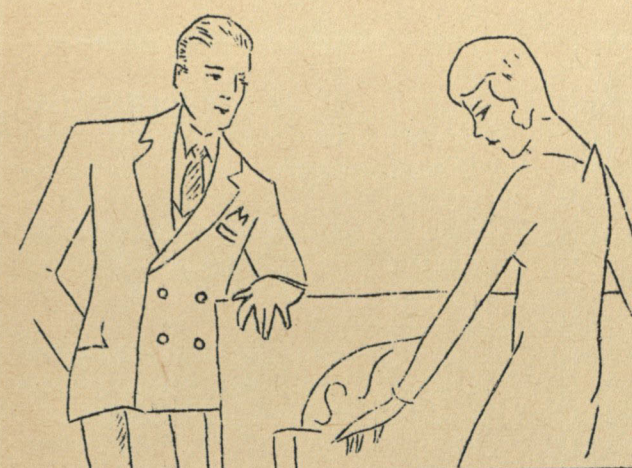

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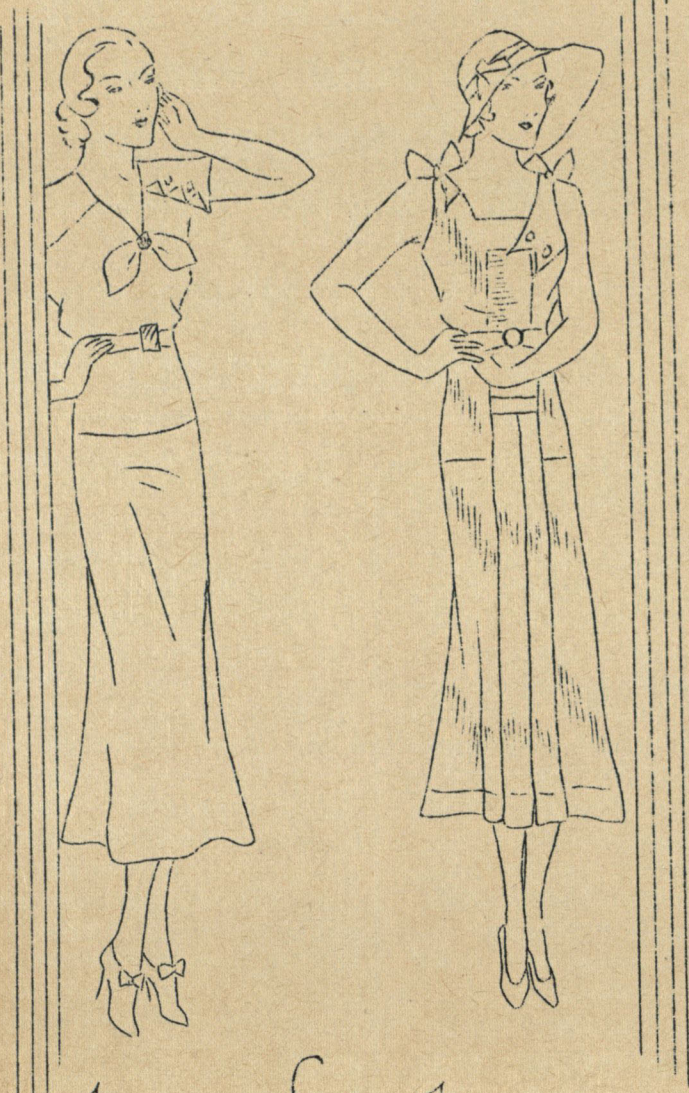
