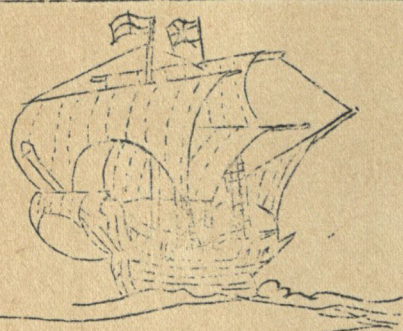
The Men's Quartet consisting of Elwood Nichols, Dean Snyder, Eric Nauman, and Perry Smith sang a group of negro songs.

#### HONOR ANNOUNCED FOR COMMERCE STUDENT

At a Commercial Club meeting which was held last week it was decided that the Club should give a prize to the most outstanding student who has been in school for one term or more during the school year previous to commencement. This award is open to a business student, an undergraduate or a post-graduate student.

To be eligible the student must have completed 36 hours in Commerce and must have a scholastic grade of not lower than B plus.

Other things than scholarship to be taken into consideration shall be: cooperation, promise of success in the teaching profession or in the business world. This is to be determined by the student's activities. The recipient of the award shall be selected about three weeks before commencement.
