BIG BAND

A big band under the direction of James W. Skidmore, C. N. C. student and one time successful band director of the Lafayette Schools, is to be organized in Danville soon.

Any student from C. N. C., Danville High School, or any one from the town of Danville who can play an instrument is urged to take part in the band.

College credit, without tuition fee, will be given by Central Normal College to students who become members of this band.

The membership of this band is expected to reach fifty. It is to play for the big road celebration in Danville and also places in Illinois.

TUITION -

Beginning next fall, Central Normal College will charge a matriculation fee of \$7 which must be paid before enrolling. Tuition has been reduced to \$35 a term, subject to 10% discount if paid in advance.

CELEBRATION ENROLLMENT

Celebration of the opening of State Road 36 will take place about Aug. 15, at Danville with a large number of business men and school executives taking an active part in the arrangements.

The completion of the road will allow all traffic to proceed as far as Denver, Colo., without any interruption or detour. Committees from Montezuma, Rockville and Bainbridge, Ind. and a Committee from Springfield, Ill., will assist the Danville committee in the celebration.

Prof., Wood, Landis Pleasant, Blue and Reibold are among the representatives from C. N. C. helping in the work. Gov. Paul V. McNutt of Ind., and Gov., Henry Horner of Ill., have been invited to speak for the occasion.

Members of the Commercial Club, Lions Club, Mason Lodge, and American Legion of Danville will participate in the ceremonies.

The long dream of a good road west will soon be a reality and the detour a thing of the past.

Central Normal's enrollment for the Third Summer Term is much better than expected considering the fact that other colleges throughout the state have had a 35% decrease for the summer. To date 411 have enrolled. 450 are expected to enroll by Tuesday morning which is the dead line for enrolling. Students enrolling Tuesday morning must also attend classes that day.

Outside of Indiana, students are found enrolled from Ohio, Okla. Illinois and Kentucky.

Many students enrolled are post-graduates working for additional licenses in many fields.

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EDITORIAL

As you will notice on the editorial page of this issue, no staff has been named. The reason for this is that many of the staff of last term left and this week is the time set apart when invitations are issued to the entire student body to try out for places on the staff.

If a paper is to be truly representative of the entire school, it must give the news of all the school and on the other hand all departments and individuals of the school must be responsible for its material and for its edition.

Because the Crier is a mimeographed paper and because many of the students of this school may have to aid in the publication of such a paper in a school into which they will go as teachers, several have asked to have experience on the staff. They are usually given the first opportunities.

However, it is the general aim of the staff to have a period of trial before they are permanently placed on the staff and then after they have served successfully for two terms as members, they are considered for membership in Kappa Pi Beta, the honorary journalistic fraternity.

THE TRAVELERS LIBRARY-Somerset Maughan, Ed. Doubleday-Doran.

The Book-of-the-Month Club chose this omnibus volume for its "book dividend" distributed in June. The reviewer was fortunately entitled to receive it. This large volume, bound in blue cloth with silver decorations contains 1680 pages. It is made up of works Mr. Maughan would select for his own reading on a voyage or journey of some weeks. Novels, novelettes, short stories, essays, and poems are included.

Arnold Bennett's "Old Wive's Tale" has the place of honor. Four novelettes - Conrad's "Youth", Swinerton's "Nocturne", Beerbohm's "Happy Hypocrite" and Garnett's strange "Lady into Fox" - lend variety and interest.

The short stories and poems are carefully selected. The essays include "Reminiscence of Conrad" by Galsworthy. Not the least of the book's worth results from the critical notes of Mr. Maughan. His introduction to the "Old Wives Tale" is very instructive. This volume would be most helpful for English instructors.

I secured Dr. Charles W. Lewis, President of Moores Hill College to deliver our High School Class address. To me he was the very picture of a cultured, refined Christian Gentleman. Well indeed do I remember that wonderful address. There was one statement in particular that I recall, and I shall never forget it. He spoke eloquently and most sincerely. Among the many good things he said, "If I had to beg, if I had but a crust to

eat to satisfy my craving hunger, I would be determined on getting a college education."

He left the impression with us that a college education was well worth any sacrifice that it might cost. Every boy and girl in that graduating class acted upon his suggestion. They became college graduates. They lived to bless this old world with a service that blessed the world and glorified God. Dr. Lewis later was President of Wyoming University.

My heart's sympathy and good will goes out to the many dear boys and girls in our own old school who are fighting the battle, and their Victory is certain. To them I wish to give one word of counsel "Don't Give Up. Finish the Fight. God will bless and help you. The harder the present struggle the sweeter will be the ultimate achievement. Whatever you do, Hang on to God!
