The Psi Chi Omega sorority is planning a Flag Dance to be held Friday, July 6 in the gymnasium.

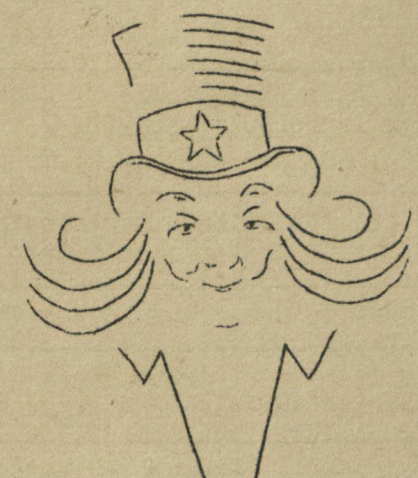
Vivian Miller is in charge of the general arrangements for the dance. Doris Armstrong is on the committee for the orchestra and Dorothy Hess is in charge of the program.

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COMMERCIAL HONORS

But not only is this an honor, for it is a handsome bit of advertising ---- the kind that pays. That is how Central Normal College attained the unique position she holds today -- by investing heavily in her students and letting them advertise her to the world.

BOOKS ON RESERVE

Reserve systems for libraries have been found valuable and often necessary in most of the institutions of higher learning. Surely this college is rapidly nearing an urgent need for such a system rigidly kept.

With increased enrollment and added difficulties in securing books, current texts in the C.N.C. Library are subjected to a demand that over-rides any one person should withhold such a volume from its freest usage for more than the shortest possible time. There need be no shortage of daily "good turns" if all will lend their support in the operation of the reserve system which is so important to us at the present time.

BEAUTY

We must all agree that there is a certain beauty to be found in even the proverbial "mud-fence". It is to be granted that there is much to be said of the angle from which we observe it and its relation to the rest of the world. Therein lie the myriad possibilities of the "mud-fence". It may be that one of the ablest of American stylists, James Branch Cabell, will interest you.

"I want beauty in my life.
"I have seen beauty in the sunset and in the eyes of divers women. But now these happy accidents of light and color no longer thrill me.

"I want beauty in my life itself, rather than in such chances as befall my lifing.

"It seems to me that many actions of my life were beautiful when I was young, in an evanished world of friendly girls, who were all more lovely than any girl is nowadays.

"For women now are merely more or less good looking, and their looks, when at their best, have been painstakingly enhanced and edited.

"But I would like this life which moves and yearns in me, to be able itself to attain to comeliness, though but in transitory performance.

"The life of a butterfly, for example, is just a graceful gesture: and yet, in that its loveliness is complete and perfectly rounded in itself, I envy this bright flicker through existence.

"There are my books, I know; and there is beauty 'embalmed and treasured up' in many pages of my books, and in the books of other persons, too, which I may read at will.

"But this desire inborn in me is not to be satiated by making marks on paper, nor by deciphering them.

"I am enamoured of that flawless beauty of which all poets have perturbedly divined the existence, somewhere, and which life as men know it simply does not afford."

There is something of sadness in those last words. But it is born of loneliness that ugly loneliness of those who never find their peers and cannot tolerate their inferiors. There is no room for such ugliness in anyone.

Emil Ludwig has given us a formula for that elusive and flawless beauty of the poet's divining. He says, "I have never known an uninteresting person, nor have I ever been bored by any one; I have always learned something, and most of all from the so-called lower classes, even when I did no more than watch them. Whether I carry on my dumb dialogues with Bismarck or our gardener is all one to me, for I am concerned with the reactions of the heart, which is moved by the same passions and beauty whether the shoots be grafted on quince-trees or nations."

FACULTY

Mrs. Daisy Jones who is teaching Children's Literature this term, is another asset to our summer faculty. Some of our students, no doubt, remember her as Daisy Mae Marvell when she graduated from her two year course here in 1927.

Mrs. Jones received her B.S. as a four year primary graduate from Terre Haute and also her M.S. there. While in Terre Haute she taught two years in the training school connected with the college--third grade and then first grade. Since then she has taught five years in the Marion County schools near Ben Davis where her husband is grade principal.

Mrs. Jones is well qualified as a primary supervisor and teacher. Her wide experience in school work also makes her better fitted to give valuable material in her college teaching.

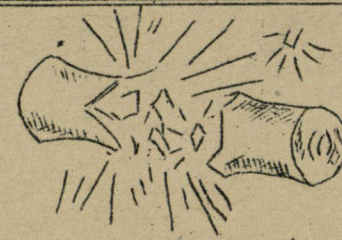

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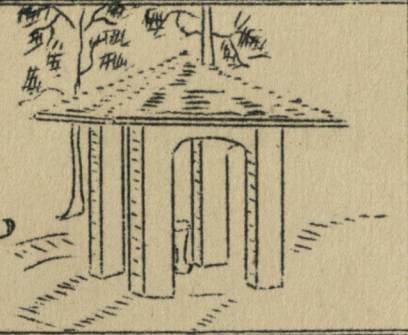

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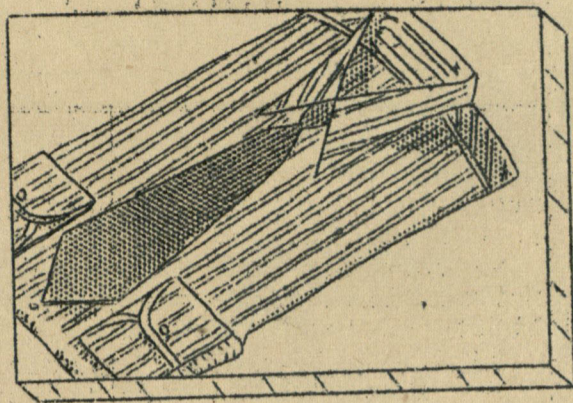
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
