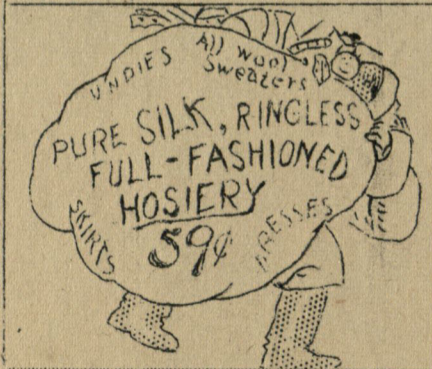
Seventeen members of the fraternity and ten guests were present. Refreshments were served and everyone was enjoyably entertained.

He opened it in a "show me" frame of mind, but he didn't lay it aside until he had to. There are many pleasant and helpful thoughts generously scattered through the book--in italics. There are a lot of "catchy" phrases, too, that make you feel that your time has been well spent. The Worm finds he can't explain that word "catchy", but that is what he means. For instance: "The innocent and beautiful have no enemy but time."; or "People don't see themselves; they don't want to."; or "It was no business of hers; so she pondered it intensively."; or "For the sword out-wears the sheath, and the heart wears out the breast." and there is the enjoyable Marta (the Worm thinks he met a sister of hers the other day) who wonders "if hell might not be an inescapable knowledge of what others think of you, after you are dead." 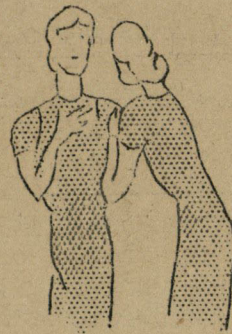
The Mixed Chorus of C.N.C. will give a Christmas cantata at the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning.
