The Purple Warriors after winning a great Homecoming battle last week will attempt to extend their winnings when they meet Defiance, Ohio, Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock on Tiber field.

Defiance has a team composed mostly of sophomores and will be very hard to beat. They have played two games in Indiana and have won 1 and lost 1. They defeated Earlham 32-6 while C.N.C. was tied by Earlham 6-6. Defiance defeated Valpo 14 to 7.

From the comparative scores of the Earlham games played by the two teams it looks as if Defiance has the edge but Coach Leitzman has been drilling his proteges and they are in fine shape except for the injury to Roudobush.

Defiance has a line that averages around 185 pounds while the Normal line averages about the same.

## AGGRESSION AND CONQUEST

Dr. Carl H. Griffey

These terms are usually applied to activities of governmental groups which undertake to extend the boundaries of their territory by force. Aggression is an unprovoked attack or an act of hostility leading to war. Conquest is a deliberate act of appropriating territory by means of force.

Wars of conquest have not been waged in recent times. Nations have been under the direction of leaders who have recognized those principles of right and wrong established by modern standards of civilized society. The World War was not in its inception, a war of aggression or conquest. It grew out of national combinations which had for their purpose protection from aggression by hostile neighbors.

It remained for Pagan Japan to give the World its first War of Conquest in modern times. Now another nation, the one longest favored by Christian influences, sends forth its armies to murder and slaughter people who have been less favored, and to take without right or leave and with intent to keep wrongfully the territorial possessions of that nation.

A person or a group of individuals who enters upon such an enterprise is taken into custody by the officers of the law in all civilized countries, and in addition to being branded as thieves, robbers or gangsters are given severe penalties. Long ago pirates were punished with such severity that they disappeared from the high seas. Our own federal government does not hesitate to strike down those enemies of society who endanger the lives of their fellow men, and these methods are proving effective.

The fact that no national regulation exists for similar punishment for the leaders of offending nations does not lessen the gravity of the offense. Neither can pompous dictators be sure that they will escape retribution. In the past a military aggressor was obliged to retire to a lonesome island.

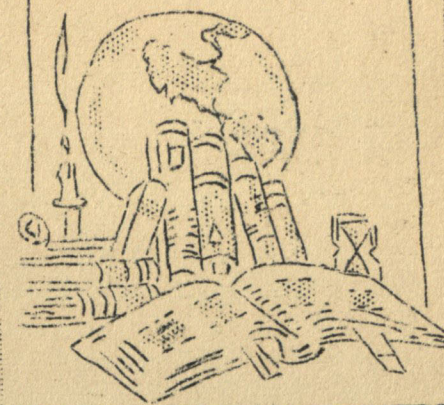

"Thank you, I shall appreciate it very much everything is so changed in the last few years," acknowledged the ex-vice-president. "Maybe I'm a bit sentimental, but I would like to see the old offices where I spent so much of my time first."

"You will hardly recognize any of them, for they have redecorated the entire first floor of the Administration Building. You will notice that the new front doors with glass panels make the hall nice and light. Joe smiled, realizing just how many surprises were in store for Mr. Whisler.

Upon opening the door a gasp of surprise escaped our guest's lips. "Why they have put in a new marble floor, and just look at that office, is that really the registrar's office?" "Yes, it is and just wait until you see the new vault."

"They really have you behind the bars where you belong at last," Mrs. Pleasant, really I do not see why they didn't do that a long time ago jokingly remarked Mr. Whisler as he left Mrs. Pleasant's office to view the new Recreation Room, not knowing that he would not find the Library there as in days of old.

"This is our Recreation Room, the Library has been moved over to the old Commerce Rooms. The back room is now a kitchen. This is used for breakfasts, tea dances, teas, and other social activities. The two music rooms are also redecorated and the old bookstore moved over to Recitation Hall. You find the room redecorated and made into executive offices. Why, how do

you do, Dr. Hightower, Mr. Whisler, may I introduce you to Dr. Hightower, our new Director of Studies and director of the N.Y.A. work."

"The next office is Dr. Wood's and the one at the end of the hall is the conference room for the Board of Trustees.

This is used for our College Mixers Organization dances. There is a kitchen at the back that is used for banquets.

"Well, the next building is Recitation Hall. Here is the new Library. And the bookstore is here--just across the hall.
