Classes after 3:00 Wednesday will float.

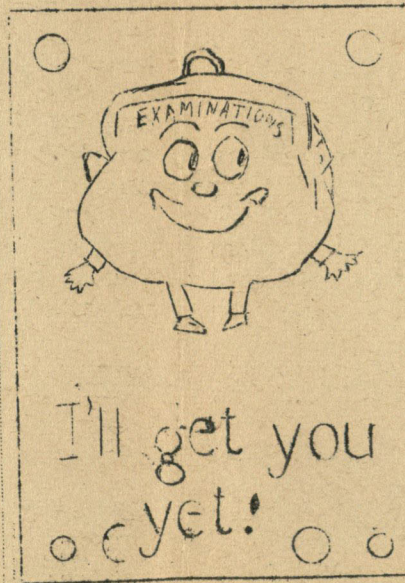
Y PROGRAMS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED SOON

Mr. Floyd E. Harper '32 has been appointed Indiana Chairman and National Committeeman of the Indiana Division of the Intercollegiate Organization of America.

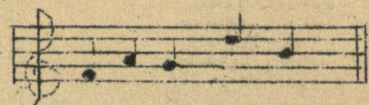

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Thanksgiving Day

Thanksgiving Day, in the United States the last Thursday in November, is annually set apart for thanksgiving by proclamation of the president and of the governors of the various States. The day is observed with religious services in the churches, and, especially in New England, as an occasion for family reunions. The Pilgrims set apart a day for thanksgiving at Plymouth immediately after their first harvest, in 1621; the Massachusetts Bay Colony for the first time in 1630, and frequently thereafter until about 1680, when it became an unusual festival in that colony; and Connecticut as early as 1639 and annually after 1642, except in 1675. The Dutch in New Netherland appointed a day for giving thanks in 1644 and occasionally thereafter. During the Revolutionary War the Continental Congress appointed one or more thanksgiving days each year, except in 1777. By 1858 proclamations appointing a day of thanksgiving were issued by governors of 25 states and 2 Territories. President Lincoln appointed the last Thursday of Nov. 1864, and each president has followed his example.

The Greatest Builders

The great teachers are the greatest builders. Other men can patch up broken legs, drive germs out of the system and produce masterpieces of machinery or wonders in the air. But the teacher turns out masterpieces of thought and of industry. He finds in those who sit at his feet possibilities of greatness. He supplies them with the training that they need. Recognizing that they have better-than-the-average minds, he forces them to use those minds.

When former President Garfield was in Washington, one of his friends asked him how much schooling he had had, and how he got it, for Garfield had been a poor Ohio boy, working on a canal. "I had very few school masters," said the President, "only one that I remember gave me any help. Such education as I had, I got sitting on a log extending out into a river."

"How did that give you an education?" "Well," said Garfield, "perhaps the fact that Mark Hopkins was sitting on the log beside me had something to do with it."

Mark Hopkins was one of the greatest teachers of his age. And I think it highly probable, if some ordinary man had been Garfield's mentor, the name Garfield would not be so famous as it is now, with all due respect to the younger Garfield, who is a man of great ability. But it is quite probable that the older Garfield, remembering all that Hopkins had taught, made the younger Garfield more ambitious that he might have been otherwise.

The greatest builders are the teachers who can waken young people to the importance of learning.

Contact with men of great minds, who know how to express to others their own thought, is a high incentive to learning and to success. The college boy who can make a friend of a highly intelligent man in the faculty "starts running".

And he is likely to count for far more when he gets out of school if he had made his mentor the football coach, or spent as much time as he dared "cutting classes".

There are good brains and inferior brains. But all of them can be improved by thinking, and the more one associates with thinking men, the more likely is he to find pleasure in that mental exercise and continue it until the last days of his life.

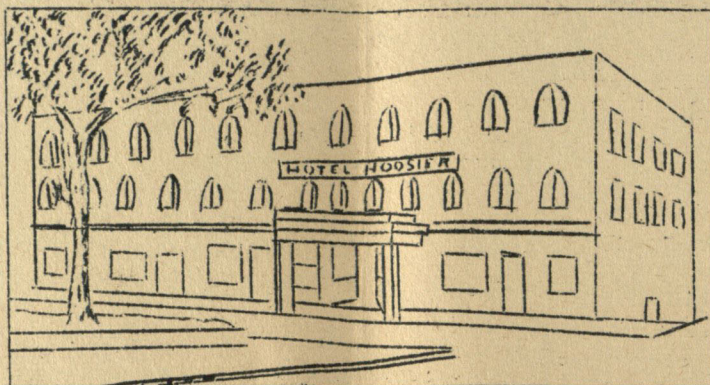

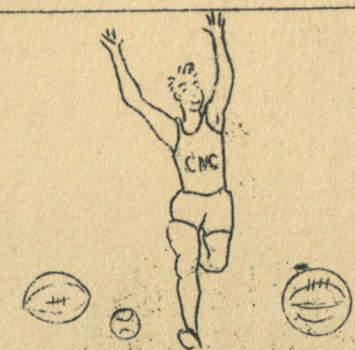
Only a few minutes to write this column but probably no one reads it anyway, so just a few scraps salvaged from the football season.

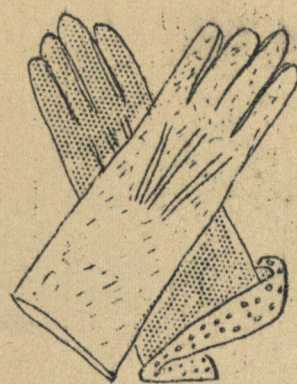
