

225,000,000 people, it is estimated, see the newsreel every week. Thousands of workers are employed. Because the

newsreel is so closely connected with the feature picture production it is difficult to know how much capital is invested in newsreel production, but it is somewhere around \$100,000,000. One company is said to have made over a million dollar profit in 1932.

The most important men in the industry are the cameramen. The minimum salary for a newsreel cameraman is \$90 a week. Some got as much as \$150 a wook. This may seem like a lot of money, but the cameraman's job is not an easy one. The cameraman not only works long hours, but frequently he works in hazardous surroundings where his life is momentarily in danger. He can't avoid danger; he must hunt out a place where things are happoning and work there. If it is a big fire, he can't got his story from the safety lines. The editor wants pictures of the floors falling in, and the walls falling out, If it is a strike or riot, he must take his position where bricks are flying, gas bombs being discharged or where the shooting is hottest. If it is a rovolution, he gets scenes of actual fighting. Cameramen are injured and receive throats, but that is just part of the game.

Contrary to public opinion, the newsroels are free from official consorship in every state of the Union except Maryland, Virginia and the City of Chicago. The movie audiences themselves do the censoring through the theatre managers. If an objectionable picture is in the reel, the theatre manager complains to the producer and says it is hurting his business and he won't buy the newsreel if such pictures continue. 
