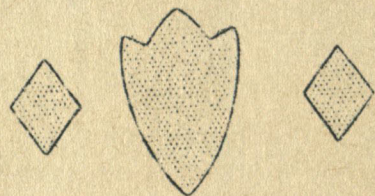



WELCOME TO ALUMNI

Central Normal College is indeed happy to welcome to the campus Senator Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma, one of its distinguished sons.

Senator Thomas attended Central Normal where he received his preparation as a teacher. After leaving DePauw University he moved to Oklahoma where he began his political career.

Senator Thomas' career consists of distinguished service in the Oklahoma State Senate, the House of Representatives, and the United States Senate.

During his service as State Senator, Mr. Thomas served as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and it was largely due to his efforts that the state was able to build the State Capitol without adding to the tax burden of the people of his state.

His service in the United States Senate has been equally distinguished. He is Chairman of the Committee on Indian Affairs and a ranking member of the Senate Committee on Appropriations. Senator Thomas has played an important part in the shaping of financial policies of the nation.

W. S. Sanford, President of Sanford Brown Business College of St. Louis, is another distinguished son who returns to the campus to receive a merited honorary degree.

Mr. Sanford, a graduate of the Commercial Department of Central Normal College received the B.S. and LL. B. degrees and taught school in Illinois after leaving the college.

In 1919 he purchased the Sanford Brown Business College of which he has continuously served as president.

Mr. Sanford has served as a member of the Missouri State Legislature where his vast wealth of information made his term of office invaluable.

Mr. Sanford is recognized as a nationally known educator as evidenced by the fact that he is President of the Private Schools Department of the National Teachers Association.

Mrs. A. Kate Huron Gilbert, who will receive her honorary degree this morning holds a place of unique interest to all the student body. As a member of the first graduating class of Central Normal College and as a member of the faculty for many years she had an opportunity for contributing to the history of the school in such a way as few people have done. She was and is familiarly known by students and faculty as "Miss Kate." Her influence was marked in the life of her students and associates. Nor has she ever lost her thrill of her associations at Central Normal College. She writes, "I am in receipt of your invitation to commencement exercises and am deeply touched by its spirit. To be present and participate would make me happy. I was a member of the first graduating class. There were twelve of us and so far as I know I am the only one yet living. At my graduation I became a member of the faculty and remained with them seventeen happy years. So far as I know I am the only surviving member of that faculty."


