## INDUSTRIAL SYSTEMS DISCUSSED

"Children should be taught to think straight" was the context of the message delivered by Mr. Alfred P. Haako of the University of Wisconsin, who was brought to C.N.C. campus last Monday morning by the National Industrial Association. He talked on the capitalistic system showing that it has multiplied the capacity for work, that it increased the right to own property, and that the consumer is the kind of the capitalistic system.

The program adopted by the council is that of the United Christian Youth Movement. Only certain phases of the program will be discussed at this conference of speech making but definitely of research and program building.

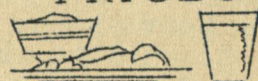


