Our line averages close to 170 lbs. compared to the heavy line of Eastern Illinois. 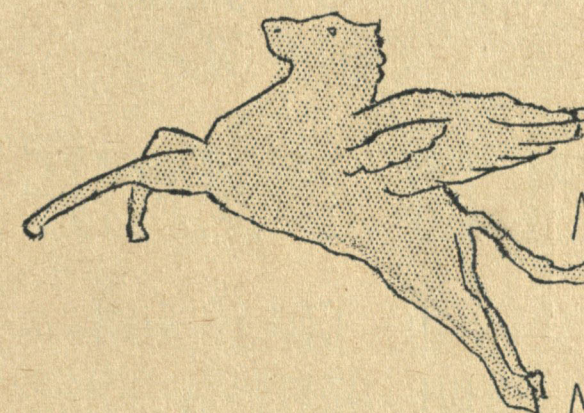
