

C.N.C. OVERPOWERS FRANKLIN

As the whistle blew, big Art Boerger, Franklin tackle and converted fullback, kicked off to those one-rushing Warriors of Central Normal. The ball rolled out on our 35-yard line. On the first play Boalbey carried the ball and made a gain of 13 yards through the line. After C.N.C. made a first and 10 Boalbey punted into the end zone. Franklin's ball on their 20. No success for Franklin as to making a first down. Fell punted to Swartz. He run to the 55 after receiving the ball on our 45. We gained about 10 yards on the exchange of punts. Clark picked up 8 yards by good running through the Franklin line. Boalbey made the first down. Clark again picked up some ground, about 4 yards but Kennedy had a little bad luck on the next play as he was thrown for a 10 yard loss. Then on a lateral from Clark, Schwartz fumbled and it was Franklin's ball. Dunker of Franklin fumbled and then Starr intercepted Kennedy's pass and ran about 28 yards. Shanahan, a great star for Franklin replaced Dunker. Then Kennedy intercepted a pass and there was also a fumble. After about 5 plays of which both sides fumbled and intercepted passes Shanahan got through the line and was brought down by Tarwaki, who did make a great tackle, and jolted Shanahan a bit. There was

an exchange of punts and nice runback by little "Zek" Schwartz. The quarter ended. Central Normal had possession of the ball on their own 40. Boalbey surprised Franklin with a quick kick and on the next play Shanahan picked up nine yards off tackle. Fell kicked to C.N.C.'s 25. Boalbey kicked 45 yds. and then on the next play Franklin was penalized 5 yards for off sides. Etter then replaced Redling, who played a nice game at left guard. Fell then kicked to C.N.C.'s 35 and we were penalized 5 yards. Schwartz leaped into the air and completed a pass to Deerr for about 15 yards. Boalbey made a gain of 3 yards and then a whole new line for Central Normal came in. A Kick gave Franklin the ball. Starr made about 8 through the line. Fell punted and the ball was received by Norman Bell who returned it about 10 yards and then on the next play which was a reverse from Williams to Gnowiech to Bell; Bell made a 15 yard gain. Allen picked up about 8 through center. Franklin then got the ball but to little avail because a certain lad from South Bend intercepted a pass on the CNC 40 and ran to the 18. Bell picked up about 8 and Allen about 9 and then the gun went off leaving us just 1 yard from a touchdown.

The second half began with the starting lineup back again. Frazell kicked off to Clark who ran to our

29. Boalbey resumed his great ability to pick up ground through the line and gained 7 yards. Off sides cost us 5 yards. Alec had a little bad luck and fumbled. Shanahan passed to Fell for about 7 yards. Starr made a first down. Shanahan on a reverse play picked up about 8 yards. After they were within the 15 yard line Franklin was determined to score, or were they? Starr and Shanahan gained enough to say that they were within 4 yards of the goal. Shanahan made about 3 and 1/2 yards and it was 6 inches to go and only the second down. But our boys looked liked immovable Rocks of Gibraltar. Franklin was within a yard and did not score. Fell kicked and Boalbey ran to our 25 yard line. A fumble gave them the ball but Deerr intercepted Shanahan's pass and Boalbey got off a beautiful kick for an out 50 yards. Starr and Shanahan again carried the brunt of the attack and they were on our 15 but Tarwaki intercepted a pass and ran about 10 yards. Boalbey then picked up 15 and the quarter was over. Our ball on our 25.

The last quarter began

ing to their 40. A pass from Fell to Frazell gained 7 but they lost the ball on a fumble. Kennedy gained about 3 yards. Boalbey got away a nice kick. Franklin crowd and players were a bit rowled about a decision and were penalized 15 yards. Fell kicked and Boalbey received and ran to 48. Allen then picked up 12 on two plays. Boalbey began to run wild and gained 11. Boalbey then ran off tackle for 25 yards and a touchdown. Bell took the ball through the line for the extra point. Three minutes remained to play and Franklin was showing poor sportsmanship and were penalized 15 yds. again for it. A series of passes started out, Deerr intercepted one. Franklin's coach sent big Boerger in to play fullback so that he might use brute force but his small gains were to no avail. They lost the ball on a fumble. But so did

we. However, Bell intercepted Fell's pass and it was our ball when the gun ended the hostilities. Franklin only made 5 first downs by running. Central Normal made 11. By punting we made about 30 yards. Our boys sure did play a great game.
