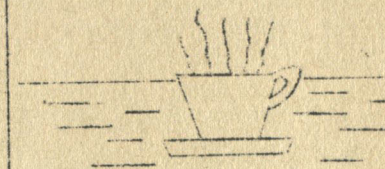

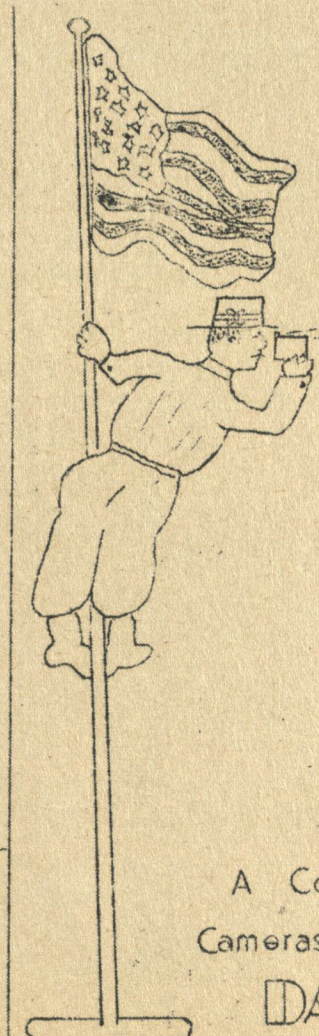

FACULTY CAR HAS AMNESIA

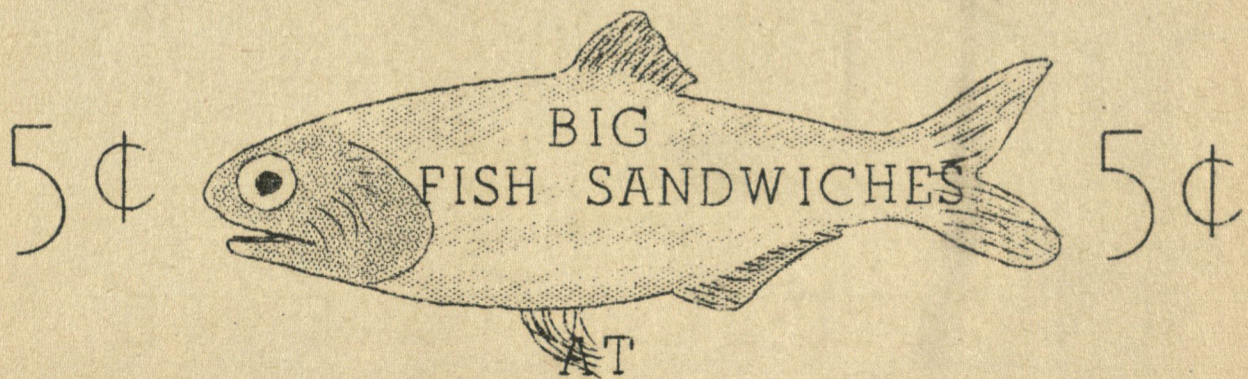
