WHAT STUDENTS SPEND ON CNC CAMPUS IN 36 WEEKS

At last a compilation has been made which should furnish certain facts for both students and business men and executives concerning the amounts which CNC students spend and what they spend it for. These facts were figured by taking the actual expenditures of 232 students for the first eight weeks of the school year of 1939, figuring from these the total expenses of 100% of the students (359 who were on campus), and then multiplying this by 4 1/2 since 36 weeks is four and one half times as much as for eight weeks.

Idle you are right in using that eagle eye on Workman after Wed. nights performance. Have you hired your Shadow as yet?

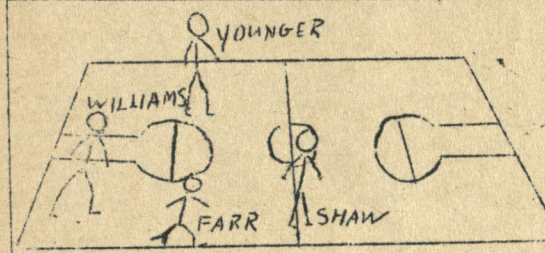

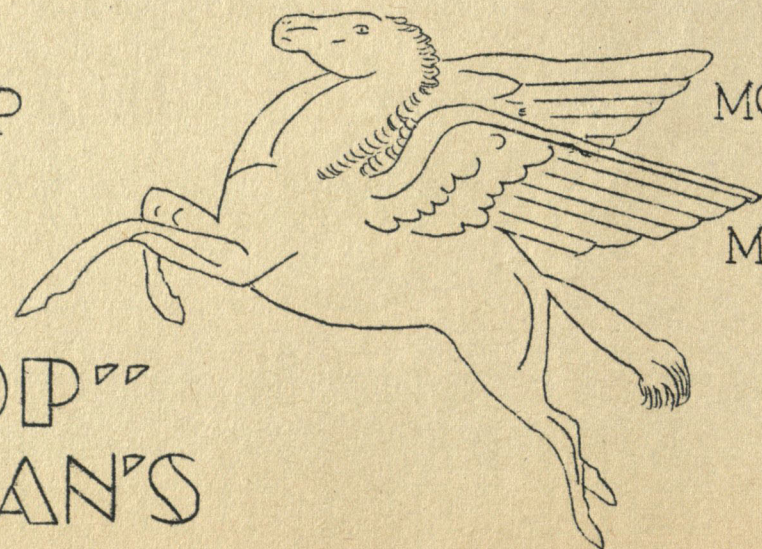

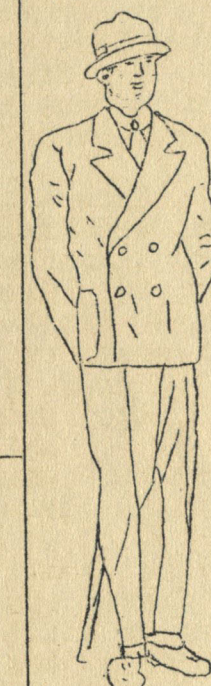
