They were awfully "snooty" but they act different now even though the fellows aren't sure about its sincerity.

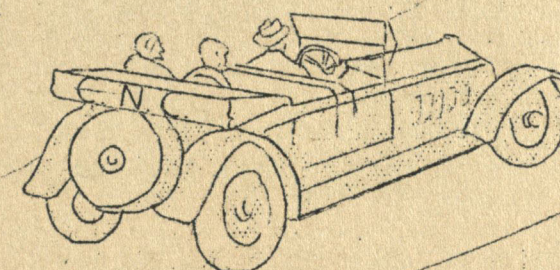

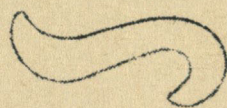
The minister hopes the students have a pleasant vacation, and that, whether they are at home or in Danville, they will be in church on Sunday.
