Announcement was made today of the appointment of Dr. P.R. Hightower, head of the department of Psychology and Education, to the position of Dean of Central Normal College.

Dr. Hightower is well equipped for this position with a wide background of study, travel and experience and will prove popular with the students and faculty.

He was graduated at Oakland City High School and attended Oakland City College. He graduated from Indiana Central College in 1914, obtained his M.A. degree from Indiana University and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Iowa.

He taught at Butler University for 11 years and organized the Emergency Educational Program for adults and Nursery School Children in the state. He has taught in Central Normal College for the past six years.

He has traveled extensively, making one complete trip around the world lecturing before various educational bodies. He is a member of: National

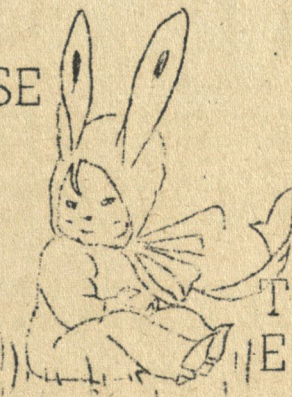

The Tri Kappas have been very helpful in giving miscellaneous articles besides the much appreciated donation which is being used toward curtaining the house.

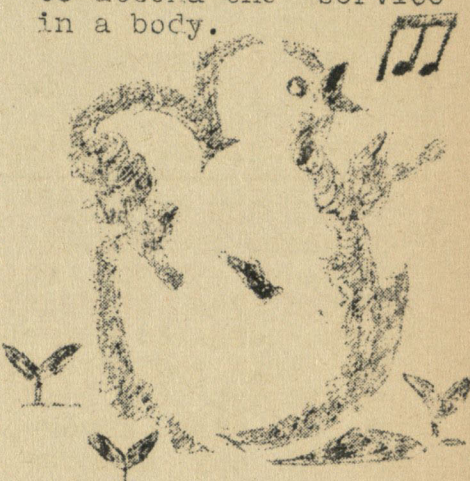

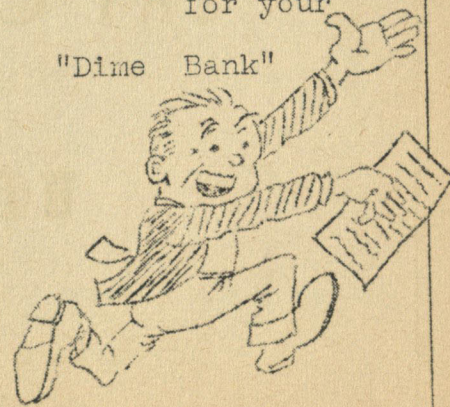

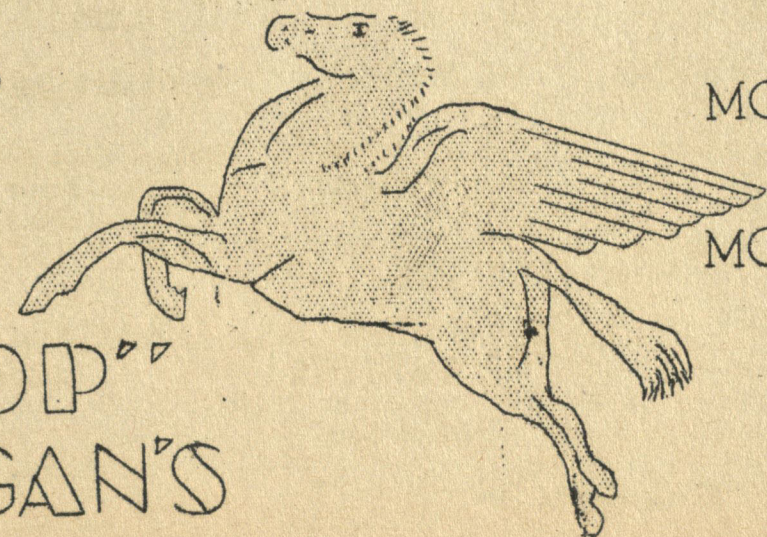

This is the second chapter which has been formed this year by alumni of Central Normal. The other was organized by Mary Evelyn Nay at Bridgeton, Indiana.

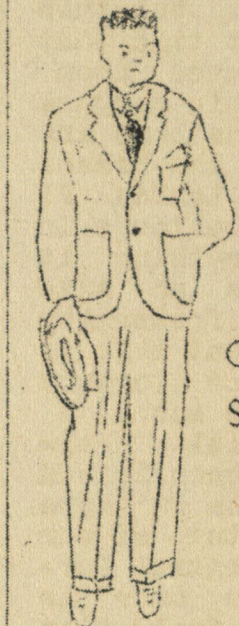
