PRESIDENT GIVES MESSAGE TO ALL STUDENTS

Central Normal College depends upon its students and alumni to provide information to the worth while high school graduates as to what types of training is offered here.

During the present unsettled conditions within our nation we are becoming eager for Central Normal students to realize that they should complete their education and show their friends at home who should be in school that the job of the near future will require the individuals who have made proper preparation.

training.

As President Roosevelt said last fall it is just as patriotic to continue normal college preparation as it is to volunteer for military service or to apply for admission to defense industry. The youth of this nation should heed the wise counsel of our president in times such as these.

If every CNC student would accept the responsibility of directing one student to Central Normal next year he would be doing the college and the individual and the nation a service which is greater than any other contribution he could make toward the preservation of our fine nation.

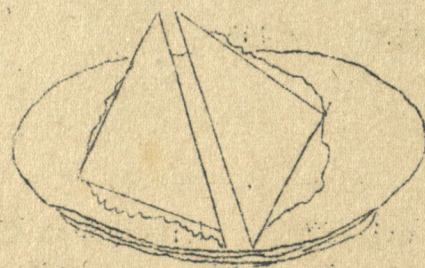

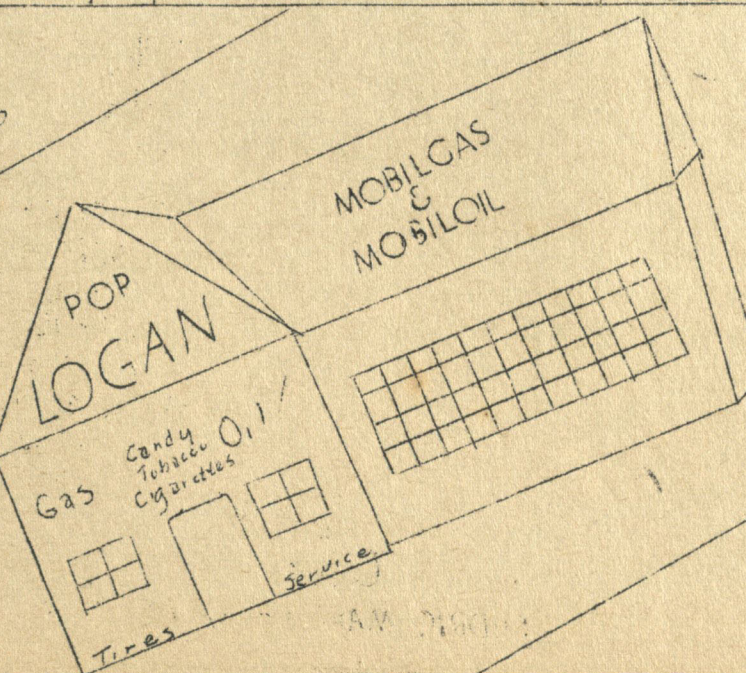

First John Oliver is wanting one girl and at the All-College Dinner he was wanting to sit by another Clodith Cassidy. How about this John? Will some one make up his mind?


INTRAMURAL SCORES


INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS CLUB

Convocation for last Tuesday was cut short due to the fact that a speaker could not be had, since he was to speak at the Freshman sponsored banquet on Tuesday evening.



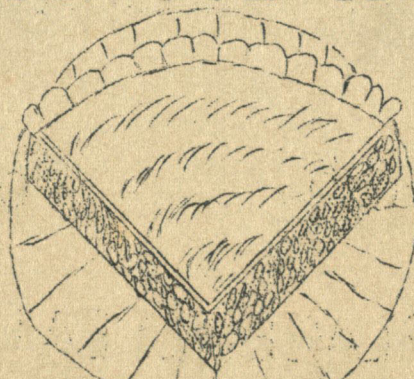
