the instructor expects of students in that course. When the work has been done by the student the instructor will accept the paper, read it through carefully and evaluate it then pass the work with his recommendation to the committee. The committee will read the assignment which the student had, examine the student's work and consider the instructor's recommendation and if they approve will then turn the recommendation sheet over to the registrar who will change the student's grade of I to the one recommended by the instructor; if the committee disagrees they will notify the instructor in writing, giving their reasons and suggesting changes.

RULES REGARDING TEN ABSENCES

The following statement has been made by the attendance committee:

"Whenever a student is absent from class ten times, the instructor will enter a grade of I on the student's record. This I the instructor will change on no condition.

At the end of the term a special written assignment will be given to the student. The work assigned to compensate for absence from class should be of such a nature that it will duplicate as nearly as possible the work missed in class. In some courses it may be more practical to ask the student to attend a corresponding class in a later term. All written work submitted for consideration is to be left on file with the committee for at least one year.

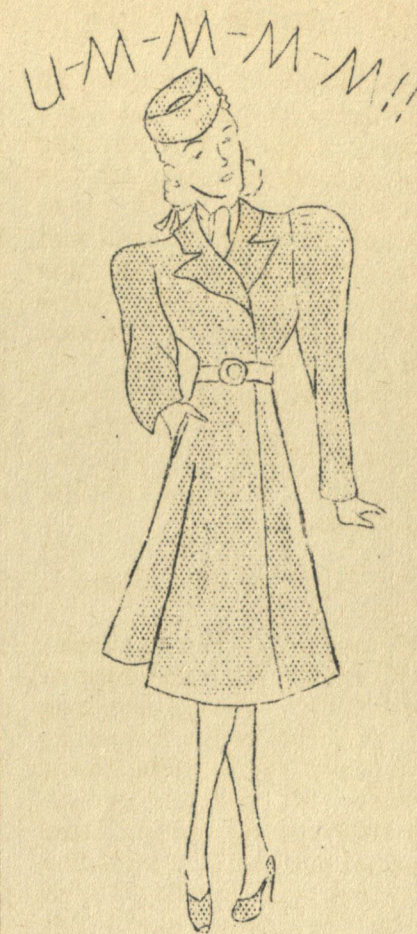
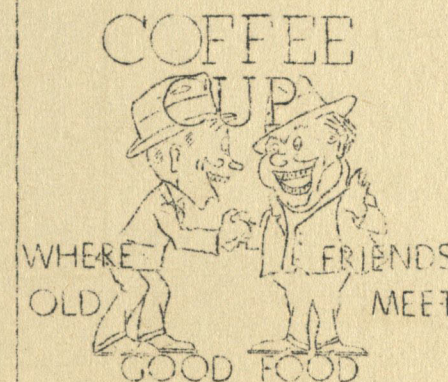
The work submitted should show all the care and scholarship of which the student is capable, and should also reflect clearly the quality and amount of the work which

The ministers of Danville are always happy to counsel with you. Seek us out and let us be your friends.

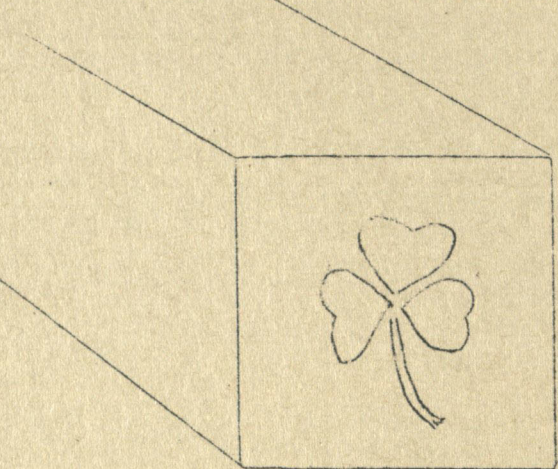
