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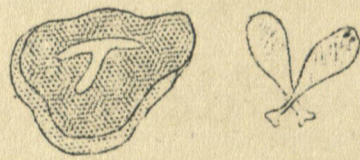

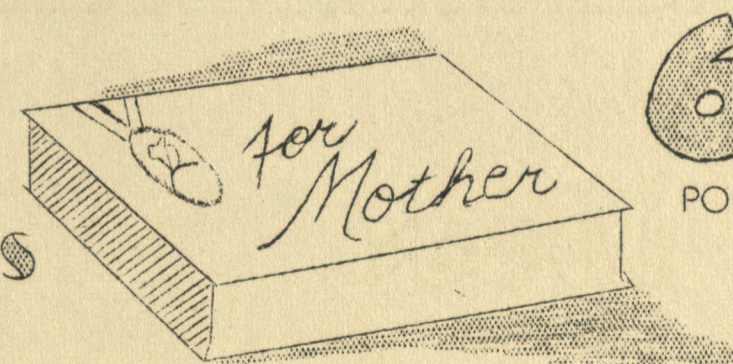

WARRIORS DEFEAT BALL STATE

CARTER HITS HOME RUN

The Warriors journeyed to Muncie, Ind. last Monday where they played the Ball State Cardinals. The Warriors emerged victorious, defeating Ball State by a 10 to 7 score.

It was the Warriors 4th straight victory against one defeat. For Ball State, it was their first loss of the season.

The Warriors made 10 runs on 12 hits they garnered off of Joyce, Ball State pitcher. Joyce struck out 11 of the Warriors in the game but he couldn't keep the Purple Warriors from getting hits when they had men on base.

Paul "Junior" Carter, God's gift to some gal, hit a home run in the 4th inning with one man on base. Junior's still telling them about that hit. Willard Brown only got one hit off the Ball State pitcher, but that came after J. Smith had singled and it was a powerful home run in the first half of the 9th inning.

"Red" Thomas won his 3rd straight victory of the season against no defeats. Red gave up 10 hits to the Cardinals and allowed 7 runs.

The game was a nip-and-tuck affair with the Warriors just managing to stay ahead. The Cardinals threatened in the last of the ninth when Stout, Cardinal SS singled, but Weibusch, 36 for Ball State hit into a fast double play, Carter to Smith to Deerr.

WARRIORS WALLOP HANOVER

Last Friday afternoon the Warriors met Hanover College in what was scheduled as a baseball game but later turned out to be a track meet for the Warriors, for they scored 21 runs and made 27 hits.

In the first inning, things looked bad for the Warriors as Brown walked the first two men to face him and then hit the next one with a wild pitch. But he got out of the hole he was in with the bases loaded and no one out, for he struck out the next batter, the next one hit into a force play at second, scoring a run and the last one popped out.

When the Warriors came to bat in the last half of the first, they really went to town. Schwartz doubled to lead off the inning, Deerr got a walk, then Brown doubled to score Schwartz. J. Smith next up hit a home run to bring in Brown and Deerr. Then Mackowiak walked and Shank singled and Waymire was hit by a wild pitch. Borchelt next up, also walked forcing in Mackowiak. Carter grounded out for the first out, Shank scoring. Then

Schwartz hit his second double in the first inning driving in Waymire and Borchelt. Deerr grounded out and Brown struck out to end the inning. Result the Warriors scored 8 runs on 5 hits, 3 walks and one man hit by pitched ball.

The Warriors scored 3 more in the 3rd inning, 2 runs in the 4th, 2 runs in the 5th and 6 runs in the 6th inning to complete their scoring.

While Hanover scored 2 in the 5th and 6 runs in the 6th innings to complete their scoring.

Brown gave Hanover a total of 9 hits and 8 runs while he struck out 8 men. 8 of these hits of 7 of these runs came in the 7, 8, and 9th innings. When the first team was in the line-up he gave up 1 run and 1 hit to 6 innings.

Everybody in the starting lineup for the Warriors got at least 1 hit, including Deerr, Carter and

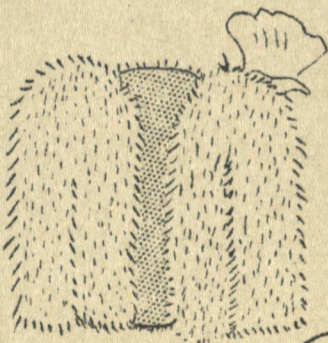

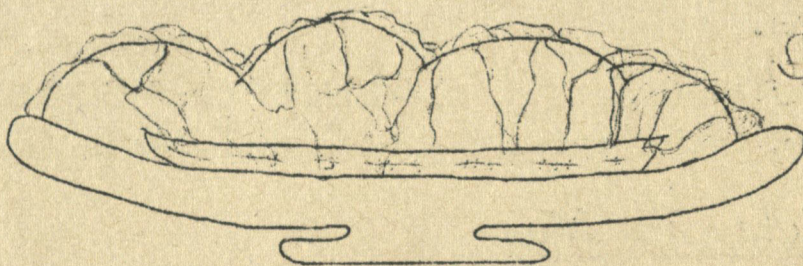
