All N.Y.A. students who are leaving should authorize some one in written form to sign the Check. Cards are in the Dean's office.

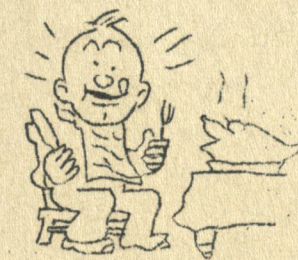

very fitting tribute introduced the Senior Lettermen. He was given a touching farewell speech since he will not be on the campus next year.


A fitting tribute was paid to Coach and his work by Pres. Hunt. A life time pass was granted to Coach to all C.N.C. games by the Board of Trustees.
