CENTRAL NORMAL FINANCE CAMPAIGN PROGRESSES

Committee at Work

The members of the finance committee, recently appointed to plan a booster program for Central Normal College, report that people contacted by the workers have announced their willingness to cooperate in every way with the work.

During the past twelve months students have paid into the community, out-gide of tuition, \$92,000, \$10,000 of which went for room rent.

Because of a change in education laws and the present war situation, which has reduced the number of young men enrolled, the attendance the past year was the lowest in many years. This reduced attendance, resulting in reduced income, means that the college may not be able to make the necessary improvements to meet present education requirements. The purpose of the present drive is to so equip the school that it will be able to place the attendance at a much larger figure.

When the local drive is completed, the alumni will take up the work of accumulating an endowment






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
